From the President

Leadership

Michael H. Steinhardt is a world renowned philanthropist and co-founder with Charles Bronfman of Taglit Birthright Israel (otherwise known as "Birthright"). According to Rabbi Shmuley Boteach, Michael Steinhardt has brought more Jews back to their heritage than any other Jewish philanthropist on the world stage today. Here is what Michael Steinhardt has to say about Jewish leadership:

"What is true leadership? It involves creativity, ingenuity and a willingness to challenge the status quo in the interest of progress towards a larger goal. For our purposes, we can identify the larger goal as an end to the decline in Jewish interest, literacy and commitment and the beginning of a renaissance in American Jewish life."

What is our Larger Goal: It is to make our temple warm and welcoming, to increase our congregation's commitment to Judaism and to begin a renaissance in Jewish life at Temple Israel with both numerical and spiritual growth. Our leadership manages, with our available resources, to move us forward. We should all take notice of our success. We are a rarity in today's world - our membership increased by almost 10% last year.

Our success has been achieved through the combined efforts of our leadership, clergy, staff and congregants, many of whom serve on our committees, Board of Trustees and Executive Committee. One congregant who, during the past several years, has stepped forward to provide management and leadership on our Board of Trustees and our Executive Committee is Don Carter.

Before our congregation heard his name, Don had, for many years, anonymously provided financial support for our services and events. When we pursued rebuilding our temple, Don stepped up time and time again with significant financial support and challenges to help drive our capital campaign.

During the process of rebuilding our synagogue, Don became a temple Trustee and then a Vice President, all in an effort to achieve our Larger Goal. As the Talmud states: If a person resides in town for thirty days, that person is responsible for continuing the soup kitchen; After three months, the charity box; After six months, the clothing fund; After nine months, the burial fund; And after 12 months, that person is responsible for repairing the town walls. (Talmud) Baba Batra 8a.

I am pleased to report that Don has agreed to be responsible "to repair the 'synagogue' walls". With our great appreciation, Don has accepted the position of President-Elect of Temple Israel for 2017. Until his presidency begins in January 2018, he will continue to serve on our Executive Committee. Since we have worked together for the past several years, the transition to his presidency will be seamless.

In addition to Don, serving on the Executive Committee this year are: Larry Abramson, Past President; Judy Shuster, Vice President and Chief Celebration Officer; Elaine Feldmesser, Vice President and Chief Transformation Officer; Marty List, Vice President and Chief Development Officer; Carole Klein, Vice President and Chief Financial Officer; Mark Feldmesser, Treasurer; Tracy Simkowitz, Secretary; Ellen Goldenson, Sisterhood President and Charlie Eaton, Brotherhood President.

Please thank Don, our Executive Committee, Board of Trustees and committee chairs for their leadership. Please also thank Rabbi Olshein, Cantor Kruk and our staff who work with our leadership to provide spiritual guidance, creative programming, educational opportunities and artistic events as part of our continuing effort toward the Larger Goal. Together, our leadership, clergy, staff and congregation are making our synagogue warm and welcoming, increasing our commitment to Judaism and beginning a renaissance in Jewish life at Temple Israel.



From the Rabbi

***Chadeish Yameinu* (“Renew Our Days”): Stretching Our Minds and Spirits at Temple Israel ...**

Sometimes, we might feel as if we are in a rut ... so what do we do when we get that feeling? Our High Holy Days liturgy asks that God help us “renew our days,” but we know that we must be God’s partners in this renewal. Sometimes, it feels like we must force ourselves to try something new, which we know will make us feel uncomfortable. And, yet, we know in our hearts that overcoming this discomfort can bring us new joy in our lives.

Two years ago at the High Holy Days, I gave a sermon about how flexibility in how we respond to the world around us builds resiliency and used a line I often use: “if we don’t bend, we break.” This month, I want to highlight three unique worship opportunities when we will be challenging ourselves to bend during Shabbat.

First, on Friday, February 10th, our Rabbi Emeritus, Rabbi Howard Shapiro, is bringing in “UnOrthodox,” a group of young Jewish adults exploring the modern world through an irreverent Jewish lens, who will push us to challenge our assumptions regarding how young Jewish adults experience Jewish communal life. (In fact, they will be taping their podcast following an abbreviated worship service that night.)

The following week, on Friday, February 17th, we are asking you to do something completely different ... the “Liverpool Rebbes” are taking us on a “magical mystery tour” through our Shabbat liturgy! Pull out your groovy 60s and 70s gear to wear at our first “Beatles Shabbat” and come ready to sing, dance, and welcome the Shabbat bride to the tune of your favorite Beatles Hits! The only thing we are asking is that you come with an open mind for a creative evening different than any Shabbat you’ve experienced before! All ages are welcome (you might even see some of our Religious School kids helping lead worship.) This would be another great time to invite your friends to join you at Temple Israel!

Lastly, I want to remind everyone that we have a service called “Out of the Box Shabbat” which happens approximately monthly on Saturday mornings (spring dates include February 4th, March 4th, April 15th, and May 20th). This service begins at 11:00am (following Torah study which occurs weekly from 9:30am to about 10:45am), upstairs in the Media Center. This interactive, creative worship is accompanied by guitar (with special thanks to Carol Garrett) and sometimes includes some gentle stretching as well as deep reflection and discussion about the prayers from the morning liturgy. We invite everyone to stay for a light Kiddush lunch following this approximately one hour service ... no RSVP necessary!

So, if you are looking to get out of our worship rut, “try on” a new way to worship to see if it “fits” you! My prayer for you this month is for you to find a way to “re-Jew-vinate” your prayer life (especially if you think of yourself as “more spiritual than religious”). I’m happy to sit down and study with you anytime if you’d like to learn more ... please remember, my door is always open.

Making Sure Our Seeds Take Root

*Take a little seed;
Plant it in the ground,
And that seed will grow
As the seasons flow
With branches all around
From The Planting Song By Cantor Jeff Klepper*

This month we celebrate the New Year of the Trees with the festival of *Tu B'Shevat*. Originally a taxing date (for the produce of the trees), it has become a time to celebrate the concreteness of the contributions of trees to our daily lives; remind us of our responsibility to care for the earth; and take a more mystical look at what it means to reach upward even as we remain grounded to the earthly world.

As we look at trees it is sometimes hard to remember that each of them, even the giant redwoods, started from a little seed. Some grew quickly, others took years or decades, yet it is only by planting and nurturing seeds will trees grow and sustain our world.

So, too, with the Jewish people - it is sometimes hard to remember that those who have been lifelong synagogue-connected members of the Jewish community began as small children. Yet, this love of and connection to Jewish life began with seeds planted in young children.

Here at Temple Israel we are planting a variety of seeds, for we know that while one seed may take root in the hearts and mind of some children, others might find a different seed more to their liking. The seeds we are currently nurturing include:

- An understanding of the power of community
 - The responsibility to help others is a value rooted in Torah
 - An understanding that Israel is a modern country in which "kids just like us" live
 - The power of prayer to calm and connect us to each other and to God
 - Living our values and understanding that no matter our age or size we can each make a difference - as our students work to raise funds for the Kids Cancer Foundation and collect food for the hungry
- School alone can only do so much. When families foster ongoing discussions and congregants support student efforts, the seeds we collectively plant and nurture in our children today will grow to ensure a vibrant Jewish future in the years ahead.

The Mussar Moment

Rabbi Shapiro

Sticky Notes.

The Mussar teachers didn't know from sticky notes. They didn't know you could paste them on your bathroom mirror so that each morning when you brushed your teeth, you could be reminded that you are more than the image reflected back. You are a soul; you are a living, breathing manifestation of a piece of the Eternal, of the Universe, of the Matter that composed the stars.

One of the first Mussar lessons we learn is about humility. Dr. Barry Horowitz wrote about this last month. The sticky note on the mirror attached to humility is "In the Divine Image" (B'tzelem Elohim). Our tradition reminds us: that is how we are made, that is our essence. Humility is not about self-denigration; humility is not about finding a corner of the room and occupying that space; humility is about allowing your essence to shine through remembering that there are other divine essences around you. Humility is about finding your place, occupying it and allowing others to occupy theirs as well.

It is hard to monitor this. The sticky note on the mirror helps. Am I always in need of being the center of attention? Am I the quiet reserved one sitting back in his chair, rarely leaning forward? Am I comfortable in my place? And here is the tricky part. It is true of all the Middot (soul traits). It isn't static. Not at all. There are perfectly appropriate times to stand up and shout; there are equally suitable moments to sit back and listen. We move in and out of our rightful place depending on the occasion, cause, and demands. It is like living on a rubber band. You find your level of tension depending on the situation you are in.

Sticky notes change during a Mussar year. There is no fixed order. This month I am putting up a deep blue one with the word "Trust" written with a black sharpie. I am working on what is demanded of me given the new political reality we have chosen as a country.
