From the Executive Director

This month I dedicate my article to my father in honor of Father's Day in June, and I extend my thoughts and gratitude to others who, similar to our dads, have shaped our lives.

I give accolades to our teachers who provide us with knowledge; the best ones also inspire and encourage us. Our families and friends teach us as well, including about sharing and compassion. In business we have mentors who disperse their wisdom upon us. For me, this was my father who steered me into being cumulative in thought, to never bring up a problem without also suggesting a resolution. And of course there is our spiritual counselor to whom we turn for both religious and personal guidance.

When I was 12 years old, my family moved to South Merrick, Long Island, which was predominantly Jewish, much more so than my previous address. My sister and I were excited to speak with the Rabbi about becoming B'not Mitzvah. We explained that we had lived too far from our last temple and our parents worked full-time. Instead of attending Hebrew School, we were tutored privately. The Rabbi replied that wasn't good enough; in order to become B'not Mitzvah, we would need to attend the temple's Hebrew School starting in Aleph class with the 8 year olds. He did not inquire into what we already knew. He was cold and discouraging with a wave of his hand, and my sister and I never pursued our studies. Our temple wasn't a social synagogue and it rarely had any programs. I attended temple only on the High Holy Days and still recall some of the Rabbi's sermons including a lengthy lecture on why women shouldn't wear taffeta dresses to temple, berating our affluent congregants. As my mother would say, he had little *tzekel*.

Over 40 years later, I have now experienced a very different feel that a temple can offer, one that embraces all who enter. Rabbi Olshein has been welcoming us into the temple, sanctuary and her office for the last eight years. She has provided us with Torah studies, rabbinical wisdom and sermons on how to look around the world and better ourselves. She has piloted and taught countless diverse programs for all ages, stages and backgrounds. She has directed our Religious School and works with our students one-on-one. Her Social Action mission is evident in almost all she does including our involvement with CROS Ministries and her association with various community leaders (integrating our *Martin Luther King Jr. Shabbat* among other programs). For me personally, she has held my hand guiding me through every holiday, imparted institutional memory, instructed me on social media and so much more. I could not have performed as well in my position this past year if it wasn't for Rabbi Olshein.

The actions of one Rabbi years ago made me disheartened with attending temple and pursuing my studies. The actions of one Rabbi now has reinvigorated my desire to learn and I attend *Erev Shabbat* services almost every Friday. And for this I say, thank you, Rabbi Olshein, for helping me bring back Torah into my life.

But as much as Rabbi's influence has my utmost appreciation, my belief in Judaism was instilled long before. From my earliest memories, I was taught to lead a righteous life and adhere to *tikkun olam*. I was guided by our traditions. And the one who led me was my father who, hand-in-hand, brought me to shul every Friday night. *L'dor v'dor*. Thank you, dad, with all my heart.

Somehow, Rabbi Olshein knew more people in our community after just one year here than many of us knew after decades in the area. Throughout her time with us, regardless of with whom you were speaking, as soon as Temple Israel was mentioned, you so often heard: "that's Rabbi Cookie's synagogue; I love Rabbi Cookie."

Whether it's strengthening Temple's bonds with other Jewish organizations, with people of other faiths or with secular community organizations, Rabbi Olshein has made Temple Israel a name in which we can take pride.

From her position as the first female president of the Palm Beach County Board of Rabbis to her role of giving hugs and hope to the homeless, she is equally comfortable with those of all walks of life. She has forged relationships with countless other congregations and cultures, the most visible result of which may be our annual MLK Interfaith Freedom Shabbat Celebration.

Best of all, we were lucky enough to have Rabbi Olshein bring the breadth of her social justice knowledge and the benefits of her contacts to Temple Israel. Programs included those on such a wide range of topics as poverty, gun safety, racial, gender and sexual discrimination, and the restoration of voters' rights. From Rabbi Jonah Pesner of RAC to Michael Twitty of Kosher Soul Food fame; from local dreamers to an Israeli "Woman of the Wall", Rabbi Olshein broadened our horizons, challenged us to confront our own limitations, and encouraged us to think "outside of the

Personal Memories of Rabbi Cookie Olshein

After eight years at Temple Israel, Rabbi Cookie Olshein's last Friday evening Shabbat service will be June 12. A Rabbi leads the congregation as a group but interacts with each congregant as an individual. These are a few personal memories Rabbi Olshein shared by Temple Israel members, edited for length.

Ilene Weinstein: "My niece, Rabbi Sari Laufer, came to visit and went to Temple. When my mother died, my niece was in communication with Rabbi Cookie, who added my mother's name to the Kaddish list. I attended and felt a great connection to Rabbi Olshein. I joined Temple Israel because of Rabbi Cookie."

Carlos Escobar: "Her smile transcended acceptance, understanding, and worship throughout the congregation."

Michell Escobar: "When Rabbi Olshein spoke, she had a way of making me feel like she was only speaking to me. To have that warmth and sense of open arms in a community is something I've never experienced before and will always cherish."

Jennifer Strauss: "My first memory of Rabbi was my first service here at Temple. During service, my toddler nephew ran up the aisle. Rabbi reached down and picked him up and continued services. That was when I knew we had a temple home."

Dave Aronberg: Rabbi Olshein always made me feel at home and at peace, no matter what "mishegoss" was going on in the outside world.

Beryle Goverman: "'How can I help?'. 'Take a deep breath'. Rabbi has been an angel to me since the day we met, always available to talk - and to talk me down."

Paul Cohen: "Rabbi Olshein brings the Torah to life in Torah Study. We read a few sentences and spend a half-hour discussing the text. Her probing questions lead us to see the words in a different light. I always learn something new from her, even though I have read these portions so many times in my life.

Charlie Eaton: "At some point in almost every Friday service, Rabbi Olshein would say, 'Tonight, we're going to do something a little different', and she would. It made every service special."

Ellen Goldenson: "The first time I met Rabbi Olshein, I confessed that I was a lapsed Jew who hadn't been affiliated with a Synagogue for over forty years. Bracing myself for a scolding, I was astonished when she said 'Welcome home' and offered a big hug."

Robert Kanner: "HamiltonHamiltonHamilton".

Sheila Lutin: "Rabbi Cookie always made services enjoyable with her wonderful imagination."

Carol Garrett: "I was struggling with the Mitzvah of eating Matzah. I'm gluten intolerant. Rabbi took my hands and told me in the Torah we are not to do anything against our health. She said, 'I wouldn't want to go against what another Rabbi says, but it's in Torah you can tell him.' Every further conversation just furthered my faith in her 'Doing the right thing for the right reasons'.

Barbara Hatzfeld: "Rabbi Olshein noticed I said my mother's name every week during the loved ones' illness time. She had me contact the office and add her name to the list."

Lewis Kapner: "Her caring messages always helped the healing process."

Adrian Sandoval: "I will always remember Rabbi Olshein for kindness, her love, and willingness to give everyone her undivided attention."

Cady Sandler: "I always appreciated how welcoming and non-judgmental Rabbi Cookie is. She made me feel totally comfortable, and her emphasis on meeting people where they are helped me transition into being more actively involved in my Jewish life again."

Barbara Brizel: "Rabbi Olshein was there for me when I needed it most. To talk and talk to cry and laugh to understand."

Rorri Geller-Mohamed: My kids would look forward to going to synagogue to see Rabbi Olshein. I love how she gave my 2 and 4-year olds the opportunity to blow a real shofar and see the Torahs in the ark up close. She really includes kids, and they love it.

Colby Stern: "She told me that everyone prays in their own way and recommended that I should pray by playing songs on my quitar, which I found to be super cool advice."

Roberta Cirino: "I will always be grateful for Rabbi Olshein's inspirational and special Shabbat Services and words of Torah, which brought me to services every Friday night for the first time ever in my life. Rabbi Olshein's words of hope and healing supported me through the most difficult times of my life."

Isabel Lucas: "Her kindness and acceptance of people is exceptional."

Jordyn Strauss: "She took an active part in me getting out of my shell, so much so that now I am President of the Youth Group, active in NFTY (Reform Jewish Youth Movement), and a teacher in the Temple religious school!"

Gayle Bard: "I benefitted most from Rabbi saying, 'A flower never grows in a place of always being right".

Amy Devore: "During my son Ben's junior year of high school, he went on an educational temple trip with Rabbi Olshein to Washington DC. He had gotten into the George Washington University but had not been offered a scholarship. Rabbi Olshein encouraged him to go into the office and ask for one while they were there. They gave him a \$60,000 scholarship. Rabbi Olshein said, 'You don't get what you don't ask for!".

Alev Yalman: "When I asked her how to think about a "religious" matter, she has always empowered me by asking what my choices are. 'You always have a choice to decide what is right for you.' I am grateful for all she has made me think and decide for myself.

Arif Mohamed: "We have come to know her as Rabbi Cookie, which fits her perfectly because she is warm, welcoming, and a very sweet person. As an interfaith family, we always felt like we had a home or a place to go where we felt welcomed and included with Rabbi Cookie, which we appreciated very much."

Esther Perman: "What I love and respect about Rabbi Olshein is her humanity. The drive she had to pursue the rabbinate as a second career – and her fierce commitment to Judaism and imparting her knowledge – reflect this, as does her unwavering dedication to matters of social justice. Yet she's as real as the rest of us – joyous game show contestant, unabashed Hamilton groupie, proud bargain shopper!"

Mary Arpe: "My fondest memories about Rabbi Olshein were when she was away on vacation! This is not a joke. Rabbi has spent several of her summer days at the Chautauqua Institution. Everyone there loves her for so many reasons and I am sure looks forward to her return when she comes back in 2021 when the institution reopens."
