Finding Compassion for Those We Dislike, or Even Hate ... and Trying to Understand Them ...

As is our custom to celebrate *Purim* at the Friday closest to the actual holiday, Temple Israel will be acknowledging the holiday of Purim on Friday, March 2^{nd.} (Passover begins the night of Friday, March 30th, this year). And while it is a time to celebrate together (and especially remember the old joke regarding most Jewish holidays, "they tried to kill us, we won, let's eat"), we must look deeper to find modern meaning beyond the obvious and perhaps even try to turn the obvious interpretations upside-down (as we are told to do with this story). Let's try to find some compassion for (even) Haman this year.

In trying to understand human nature, I have often tried to figure out what motivates someone to do bad things. What do they get out of being "the bad guy"? What do they get out of hurting others? What feelings are validated when they knowingly make the wrong choice?

If we really turn the *Purim* story upside down, can we find even a small amount of empathy for the evil Haman's need for self-aggrandizement? Can we try to rewrite the story as someone who once had power who is now feeling pushed aside and becoming irrelevant? Can we imagine the anger and hurt which then would motivate him to treat a whole swath of people with indifference?

Today, as we listen to the news (and the political pundits), we have all heard stories of people feeling irrelevant and pushed aside, on BOTH sides. We listen to the stories of people who become motivated by the need to feel heard, with some of these people even sometimes resorting to violence, because this provides the attention they seek in order to feel important.

What we are not hearing are stories of people coming together to learn with and listen to each other ... to validate feelings of hurt and to try to understand how we can all work together so all people can feel important and *heard* within our society. On a community level, Temple Israel tries to address these issues through our Courageous Conversations series (our next event will focus on immigration issues on April 27th), but on a micro-level, I ask you to consider the last time you intentionally sat down to have a meaningful conversations require humility, a precious virtue in Judaism, and patience, as hearing and understanding "the other" requires time and respect.

This month, as we intentionally turn our holiday upside down with celebration (check out the details elsewhere regarding our Upside-Down Breakfast-for-Dinner and our other upside-down antics), let us remind ourselves for the need to shake up our lives by trying to really understand those with whom we disagree. Fulfilling the *mitzvah* of compassion when listening, especially regarding those with whom we disagree and/ or dislike, can strengthen our own understanding of our beliefs.

As I end each month, my door is always open to help you on your Jewish journey. Please let me know how I can be of assistance.



In the *Mussar* approach to living a life in tune with tradition's insights about goodness, morality, spirituality and ethical living, the attribute of humility is a key concept. Unlike the conventional use of the word where we think that to be humble is to be low and to subjugate your ego so that you are like a speck of dust on a polished surface, visible but not an in your face statement. Humility for the *Mussar* Masters is finding your rightful place in that moment of time or in that space. Like most *Mussar* attributes, it is not a fixed place but fluctuates depending on circumstances and demands.

At this moment this approach reminds me of the "Next Person I Want You To Meet: Said Kashua". So, I don't know him personally; I know him through his novels, his interviews, his essays and articles in the Israeli press, his reputation. Much of his work can be seen through this humility lens. He writes about finding his place. Born in a Palestinian village in Israel, educated in the Israeli school system, he asks 'where is my place in this society that is both mine and not mine'. I wouldn't describe him as humble in the conventional definition but I am pretty convinced he is on the humility spectrum. We all are.

When you walk into a party where the room is filled with strangers – consciously or unconsciously you need to find a place. Do I walk right up to the center of the space and start telling my story? Do I find a corner near the door so I can escape? Do I find the bar and drink in hand slowly integrate myself into a comfortable place? The room is life. What is your place? Where is your comfort level? When do you need to stand and shout? When do you need to sit back and listen? When do you need to fill the room, when do you leave room for others?

Being humble is being aware of the "you" in relation to the "other". Enjoy the journey!

President's Circle

President' Circle (PC) - What is it? Why should I/we join? What is the cost?

These are questions that we hear often at Temple Israel and they each have simple answers.

So, let's start with the what and why.

TI's President's Circle is made up of dedicated TI members who are able to financially contribute more to our Temple through their Annual Commitments so that we may continue to operate during the year and offer adjustments to those members who may need financial assistance.

Throughout the year we offer special programs and events for members of our President's Circle. Past events have been an *Erev Shabbat* where we honor every PC member, a holiday boat parade, and special meet & greets, dinners, brunches with visiting scholars and speakers.

Now - the cost.

Depending on your current Annual Commitment level the difference between your current dues and President's Circle dues will vary.

For instance, if there is a couple that is over 45 years of age who have been members of TI for more than five years – their Annual Commitment in 2018 is \$1,960.00. If that same couple who is over 45 years of age wishes to join the President's Circle at the Silver Level at \$2,500.00 the difference in their Annual Commitment is \$540.00. What does that mean - that for less than an additional \$50.00 per month, that couple may become members of TI's President's Circle. So, instead of paying \$1,960.00 for the year, the couple will pay \$2,500.00 for the year

The Annual Commitment of a President's Circle member starts at the Silver Level (\$2,500.00) and has levels with increased giving amounts. **These giving levels are your Annual Commitment** - you DO NOT pay your Annual Commitment in addition to your PC giving.

Also, new members who commit now for 2018 will be invited to the PC brunch on March 11 with Sayed Kashua at the home of Nancy and Barry Horowitz.

Several years ago, our congregant, Mark Cohen, an artist in his own right, loaned two limited edition lithographs, hand-signed and numbered by the artist Theo Tobiasse to the Temple. They have hung in Rabbi Shapiro's office and in the front lobby of the Temple Office since that time. In celebration of Rabbi Shapiro's 50 years of service, Mark has donated these two pieces to the Temple. They are each part of limited editions of only 99 valuable pieces.

The artist Theo Tobiasse, was born in Jaffa, Israel in 1927 of Lithuanian parents. His father, a Zionist, was a printer and in order to find work, he moved the family to Paris in 1931. For two years during the war (1942-

1944) his family stayed hidden in a tiny apartment in Paris. Theo and his family survived the war when Paris was liberated in 1944. He went on to work as a successful advertising artist. In 1961 he entered his first art show and won the Grand Prize. Since then, he has been highly regarded in the fine art world. His works have been on exhibition throughout the western world and Japan. He died in 2012.
