The Importance of Interfaith Families in the Reform Movement ... and at Temple Israel

For too many generations, those who fell in love with someone not Jewish were not fully welcomed within the Jewish community, often resulting in these families feeling as if they were second-class citizens in the Jewish world. However, for more than 40 years, the Reform Movement has consciously reached out to interfaith families to welcome these families into our Jewish communities. We are proud to say that Temple Israel does the same.

For about two thousand years, Jewish status was historically determined by the mother's religion, however, this was not always the case (in the Torah, the father's religious status determined the child's). In 1983, after much study and discussion, the Reform Movement formally adopted the idea of patrilineal descent, meaning that a child born either to a Jewish mother or Jewish father, who is educated and raised in the Jewish tradition, including participation in Jewish life cycle events, is considered Jewish. Since this time, the Reform Movement has not treated interfaith families as second-class Jews.

I entered Rabbinical School knowing that I would perform interfaith Jewish weddings because I believe in the value of creating Jewish families, especially when one partner happens to not be Jewish. Here in Florida especially, where we have many interfaith families who have not yet found their "Jewish home," we have a great opportunity to welcome them to Temple Israel, unlike other denominations of Judaism which approach interfaith families differently. (There is a brand new demographic study of the Jewish Palm Beaches which fully supports this idea – we will hear about this during our Friday, March 8th, services when a Federation representative shares the study results with us).

In furtherance of this goal, I am proud to announce that I have been selected as a Rukin Rabbinic Fellow, sponsored by an organization called, "InterfaithFamily" (you may be familiar with their website at www.interfaithfamily.com). Eleven North American Rabbis were selected to become the first cohort of Fellows focusing on refining our skills working with interfaith couples/families. Through professional development provided by InterfaithFamily, including immersive retreats, regular webinars, and one-on-one mentoring, I will be learning about how Temple Israel can better, and more intentionally, welcome these families to Temple Israel.

I will need your help in this process, particularly with regard to reaching out to interfaith couples. Please let me know if you know any interfaith couples seeking spiritual assistance and/or a spiritual home, and let them know that I am available to speak with them. This will not only help Temple Israel grow, but will also help perform the *mitzvah* of connecting Jews in a meaningful way to the Jewish community – meaning, what is good for the Jewish community is good for Temple Israel, and vice versa.

As I always say, please let me know how I can help you on your Jewish journey ... and please help me connect Temple Israel to others on theirs. May this be God's will.

The Mussar Moment Barry Horowitz, M.D.

How prevalent is worry and how well is this trait known to the Jewish tradition? There is a joke that asks, "What does a Jewish telegram say?" The answer is, "Start worrying. Letter follows." This past December, I took my family on our annual holiday cruise. My middle son was coming into town the day before we left from D.C., connecting in Atlanta. This was to be a day of stormy weather, and I worried if he would make it. So, I obsessively tracked his flights and I tracked the originating flights and I tracked the weather. I could not control any of this, but in the end he made it just fine with a lot of wasted energy on my part.

All of our worrying is about what might happen in the future and all worrying is really a form of fear. Worry can be a never-ending, unproductive and corrosive inner state that doesn't ever do any good and instead just wears you down. This is to be separated, however, from concern, which is both healthy and warranted in life. It is good to be concerned about some things because they are complex, or obscure, or difficult and you need to be concerned that you will get them right.

One illusory way that we deal with worry is to try to control it or to control the situation about which we worry. Of course, each of us has real gifts and strengths that we are obliged to put to work on behalf of our goals. However, we also need to align ourselves closer to the truth when we recognize that it is an illusion to think that we control all the factors that go into anything that happens. Our choices are real and do make a difference, but we are neither the author of the script nor the director. Seldom do we determine a final outcome. At most we are actors with some influence, but that's it. As soon as we stop over-emphasizing our own role in the world, worry can cease and suffering for it will end.

Simply Jewish Second Person, Michael Twitty Master Story Teller - Amazing Chef













Black-Eyed Pea Hummus (Michael Twitty)

1 15-ounce can plain black-eyed peas, rinsed and drained (preferably organic)

1/2 cup of freshly squeezed lemon juice

1/4 cup extra-virgin olive oil

1/3 cup tahini

4 minced cloves fresh garlic

1-1/2 teaspoons kosher salt

1 teaspoon mild or smoked paprika

1/2 teaspoon cumin

1/2 teaspoon coriander

1/2 teaspoon chili powder

1 teaspoon brown sugar

1 teaspoon hot sauce

2 tablespoons minced fresh parsley, for garnish

1 tablespoons sesame seeds, for garnish

Mash or process the black-eyed peas in a food processor. Mashing makes for a chunkier hummus, while processing makes for a smoother dip. Pulse for about 15 seconds at a time until the peas are broken down. Continually scrape the processor so that everything gets mixed in.

Mix the olive oil and tahini together with a whisk. Turning the hummus into a mixing bowl, drizzle this in a bit at a time until everything is incorporated.

Add the lemon juice, garlic, paprika, cumin, coriander, chili powder, sugar, and hot sauce and mix well, adding more to taste if necessary.



Transfer the hummus to a bowl. Sprinkle with a bit of paprika, the parsley, and the sesame seeds. Drizzle with extra olive oil, if you so choose.
