

The Holy Synagogue

Before I write this column, I read the monthly Torah portions. Leviticus, Chapter 19 is one of this month's parashot and it contains numerous rules and regulations including commandments to "be holy," the Ten Commandments, rules for the proper treatment of the less fortunate and specific prohibitions against profane behavior. Some of these rules and regulations are applicable today, but some are related to a different time and society. Initially, from the commentaries on this Chapter, I learned that: a) this parasha is known as the "Holiness Code" and b) I really did not understand what it means to "be holy." Searching for more guidance led to reading more commentaries. Here is some of what I found. According to Rabbi W. Gunter Plaut [Z"L, Of Blessed Memory] "The culmination of this climactic chapter is verse 18: Love your neighbor as yourself." The Talmud teaches us that the meaning of this verse is that we must welcome strangers because we were once strangers in the land Egypt and that this holy commandment takes precedence over the study of Torah and even over the observance of Shabbat.² Accordingly, holiness seems to be focused more on how we treat each other than on ritual observance. For a variety of reasons (some of which are educational deficiencies and others of which are deficiencies not worthy of being mentioned), I still did not know what it means to "be holy." My next source was our rabbi.

Rabbi Olshein and I meet for an hour on Thursdays to discuss temple matters, programs and events. During one of our meetings last month, I departed from our usual discussion and asked Rabbi Olshein for the definition of "holy." She explained that holiness concerns the separation of the extraordinary from the ordinary and the sacred from the profane or mundane. For a moment, I thought we were discussing Havdalah services. When we think of Havdalah, we think of Shabbat as the sacred experience and the rest of the week as the mundane experience. But, it is not only when we come to temple for Shabbat that we may have a sacred experience. Anytime we enter our synagogue, we are separating ourselves from the ordinary experiences of our day and are opening ourselves up to the possibility of having an extraordinary experience at Temple Israel. I felt this separation from the ordinary when our congregation had the extraordinary experience of "welcoming the stranger," Wajahat Ali, in February. I feel it when I hear an Executive Committee member, Trustee or congregant express excitement for a service, program or event at our temple. My experience is that we are making our temple a place to enjoy a friendly community, ethical behavior and extraordinary experiences. Perhaps, this is what it means to "be holy."

I am not referring to "being holy" as a spiritual experience, which you can certainly have at our synagogue. According to Dr. Steven Kepnes, spirituality is more of an individual religious experience and holiness is more of a communal experience. As support for this position, Dr. Kepnes references Leviticus Ch. 19:v.2 wherein Moses was instructed by God to "Speak to the entire congregation of the children of Israel, and say to them, You shall be holy for I, the Lord, your God, am holy." So, if being holy is not a spiritual/individual experience, then what is it and how do we get there? Apparently, "there is nothing inherently holy about us" and consequently we must "raise ourselves up through our deeds" to try to "be holy." If we can become holy through our actions and holiness is a communal attribute, then what actions must we, as a community, undertake? Stuart Binder, the Cantor at Congregation Beth Chaim in Princeton Junction, NJ, stated in an article for My Jewish Learning that: "Being holy is not defined by synagogue attendance or by outward signs of piety. Nor is it a matter of ritual practice or personal attitude. Holiness can be found only in our relationships with other people. It is revealed when we are just and compassionate. It is manifest when we are respectful to others and ethical in our behavior."

I still cannot claim a deep understanding of what is holy and I do not want to take a "holier than thou" attitude about being holy, but, I can state an observation: we, at Temple Israel are welcoming and treat each other with respect, compassion and kindness. In other words, whether we are in our sanctuary, classrooms, offices or social facilities, we are adapting the essence of the Holiness Code within our temple community. While others with more knowledge and understanding can determine whether we are becoming a "holy community," I can say that 1) our congregation has enjoyed extraordinary experiences through our adaptation of the Holiness Code; 2) our Temple Israel community will be a better place the more that we adapt the Holiness Code into our congregational relationships; and 3) if trying to be a holy community results in respectful, ethical and compassionate relationships and behavior, then let's try to be holy.

From the Rabbi

Connecting with Our Spiritual Homeland... and Defending It...

Each spring, a week after Holocaust Remembrance Day (Yom HaShoah), we observe two holidays here that connect us to our people's spiritual home, the country of Israel, Israeli Memorial Day (Yom HaZikaron) and Israeli Independence Day (Yom HaAtzma'ut).

Occasionally, I am asked, "Rabbi, why do we celebrate these days when we don't live in Israel?" I have often responded by saying: "Observing Israeli Memorial Day helps us connect with all those who made the ultimate sacrifice so we could have a place to go should (God forbid) we ever need." But I think my answer should really go deeper.

Celebrating these two days helps us connect both with our people, and the traditions of our people. I recently came across this quote attribute to Gustav Mahler, which said: "Tradition is not to preserve the ashes but to preserve the flame." I believe that, each time we sing Israel's national anthem, *HaTikvah* (which means "The Hope"), we connect ourselves to the generations yearning for the Promised Land – from those who yearned upon hearing God's promise, to those who wandered the desert for 40 years, and then to every generation which was either sent into the diaspora and not allowed to return, or those who choose to live outside of Israel (as most of us do). By honoring the creation of Israel, and truly celebrating its existence, we preserve the flame of the Jewish people and our people's mission, to be a light unto the nations.

This year, at services on Friday, May 13, when we remember those who died for the creation of, and defending, the state of Israel, as well as celebrating Israel's Independence Day, we will discuss an issue causing harm to Israel's very survival, the BDS (Boycott, Divestment, and Sanctions) movement. We will examine some of the tactics currently being used against Jewish students on college campuses, as well our governmental responses to this campaign. I hope you will join us for a thoughtful evening learning about who is behind this campaign, how it hurts Israel, and what we can do in response.

On a lighter note, at the end of the month, please mark your calendars for our (at least annual) "Shabbat on the Beach" on the Friday of Memorial Day weekend, May 27 (please note that there will no service at Temple Israel that evening). This is always a fun (and very "Florida") way to welcome in Shabbat!

As we focus our energy toward celebrating our people's Promised Land, perhaps this is a good time to ask ourselves what our own personal, spiritual "Promised Land" looks like. This month, may we give ourselves time to ponder the deeper questions about our own spiritual journey and where it is each of us is heading.

As always, my door is always open to those wishing help along the path ...
