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# From the President

### Arcadia, Chaos and Temple Israel

On Saturday evening, April 1st, thanks to the efforts of Eunice Barros and Sherry Jacobs, I sat with more than 40 other congregants in the theater at Palm Beach Dramaworks watching a performance of *Arcadia* written by Tom Stoppard.

Among several themes, Arcadia demonstrated the application of Chaos Theory to human behavior. We learned that, according to this theory, seemingly chaotic events affecting one group from one century can produce patterns of behavior which affect and predict behavior in another group in the present. We also learned that the introduction of human complexity, miscommunication and misinterpretation can produce significant changes in future behavior and events. The results can be chaotic.

We have always been faced with chaos. According to the Bible, before the world was created, there was chaos, *Tohu VaVohu*. However, it was out of chaos that something positive emerged. "We need chaos." states Rabbi Jeremy Rosen, "It strengthens us. It always has. Within chaos the small little atoms of cohesion survive to build another world."

Chaos is, therefore, not irrevocably chaotic. As Chaos Theory describes, worlds end and new worlds are born with some degree of predictability from the legacies of the past. One essential question asked by the play is: how do we live with the certain knowledge that our world will inevitably end?

In the circumstances of Arcadia, one of the characters, Hannah, suggests that the answer lies not in knowing the end, but in trying to understand: "It is not the 'what' we're looking for; it's wanting to know that makes us matter." And it is our wanting to know as a community, a congregation, which leads us to form the bonds so that there is predictability in the future.

We want to know that as people, the contributions we make to our world matter. We want to know that as a congregation, Temple Israel will continue to evolve.

Our synagogue's adaptations and changes into various iterations during the past 90+ years lead us to believe that there is a predictable future for Temple Israel. But, there is a gap between believing and knowing. We matter, as Hannah stated, because we want to know. So, we are in the process of creating some predictability for our synagogue by establishing an endowment program.

Legacy giving has become an essential element of financial stability for Jewish organizations and it is essential for Temple Israel. By assigning a portion of a life insurance policy, retirement fund or through estate planning, you can create a legacy for you and your family which costs you nothing today.

We can help you create your legacy. Our synagogue has been selected to receive a grant from the Life & Legacy Program, a program created and supported by the combined efforts of the Jewish Federation of Palm Beach County through its Jewish Community Foundation and the Harold Grinspoon Foundation. We now have a systematic, incentivized and collaborative way to create endowments.

If we meet the relatively limited goal created by the Life & Legacy Program of obtaining 18 required letters of intent this year, our synagogue will receive a subsidy in addition to funds obtained through the actual endowments. The program lasts 2 years and the goals gently escalate as do the subsidies.

# From the Rabbi

## To What Do You Feel Obligated Jewish-ly? How Do You Express This Obligation?

I don't remember studying the holiday of *Shavuot* when I was a kid in Religious School and, in fact, most of my adult Jewish friends don't remember learning about it either. I realized that it usually occurs at or after the end of the school year, meaning that teachers had to think ahead to the summer to include it in their curriculum, or it was forgotten. However, because of its meaning, perhaps we should consider this one of the most important holidays of the year.

The word "*Shavuot*" means "weeks," referring to the 7 weeks of 7 days that we count from the 2<sup>nd</sup> night of Passover (when we are liberated from our slavery) until the holiday of *Shavuot*, which is when we not only receive the Ten Commandments, but this is the day when we truly become a people.

The sages teach that many groups were offered the opportunity to become God's chosen people, but each turned God down. Only the Jews accepted God's offer to enter into a unique relationship of obligation. As we are not orthodox Jews who believe that we are obligated to follow the commandments as received at Sinai and then expanded by the sages, the question for liberal Jews then becomes: what obligation do liberal Jews have to practice Judaism? Is it about what we eat or how we pray? Is it about doing social action or social justice? Is that enough?

Reform Jewish theology teaches us that we are each obligated to investigate and learn about our faith traditions and then make meaningful decisions based on our learning. Regarding worship observance, I find meaning in celebrating Shabbat with other Jews every week through both worship and study, even when I am on vacation, so I prioritize finding a *Torah* study session and attending other worship services ... and it has afforded me the most wonderful opportunities to meet new people. I have celebrated Shabbat with the local Jewish communities in Budapest, Prague, Australia, New Zealand, and El Salvador (as well as on many cruise ships) and would not give up the opportunity to meet other Jews who were also intentional about connecting with other Jews. In other words, for me, connecting with other Jews and learning about all the different ways to "do Judaism," without judgment, is an important part of how I express my Judaism. For me, feeling part of a people connected by history, heritage, and tradition is important.

As so many people begin their summer travels (or at least are planning them), my question for you this month is this: how are you intentional about experiencing your Judaism when you travel away from home? Do you feel obligated to connect with other Jews? Why or why not? What commandments resonate for you? How do you make these feelings of connectedness come alive as you experience your Jewish life? How can I, and Temple Israel, help you feel more connected?

My prayer for you this month is that you continue to find meaning in Jewish learning which results in "Jewish doing." May you always feel a connectedness to your Jewish family at Temple Israel and Jews throughout the world ... and, as I always say, please let me know how I can help you on your Jewish journey.

## The Mussar Moment

On the evening of the second Passover Seder, we began the traditional counting of "the Omer," marking the 49 days that lead us from Passover (and the exodus from Egypt) all the way to *Shavuot* (the holiday of the giving of the *Torah* at Mt. Sinai). When we look at periods like this that link the high points on our calendar, we are wise to see them as more than just gaps in the schedule. They are not just merely connective tissue,

like the insignificant string that holds the pearls. The order of the calendar creates connections and we can learn a great deal by identifying what those connections are, and what they mean.

It is traditional in the Mussar world to use this 49-day period as a time for spiritual practice. Various systems have been developed to support that practice. One such system is based on what was done in the Mussar yeshiva of Kelm in 19th century Lithuania.

This practice draws its inspiration from *Pirkei Avot*, a compilation of the ethical teachings and sayings of the rabbis of the Mishnaic period (ending around 200 C.E.). The name *Pirkei Avot* is often translated as, "*Chapters of the Fathers*" but it can also be rendered, "*Chapters of Root Principles*." What we have in this book is the core Jewish principles for an ethical and spiritual life, and section 6:6 provides 48 such principles. As practiced in the Kelm yeshiva, one of these principles is to be reviewed and practiced every day, with the 49th day of the Omer (*Erev Shavuot*) given over to a review.

Some sample topics are: Day 1 – study; Day 5 – awe; Day 8 – joy; Day 13 – a settled mind; Day 21 – being slow to anger; Day 30 – loving God. And so on, to a total of 49 insightful, practical, transformative lessons and practices that have spoken to and been revered by dozens of generations before us. While we are well into this period, you can still sign up with the Mussar Institute (www.mussarinstitute.org) to receive the daily lessons.
