## The Sanctuary of Silence

One of the greatest Bible teachers in the world, Professor Israel Knohl, recently retired from Hebrew University. His finest book, in my opinion, is "The Sanctuary of Silence".

That pretty much describes our physical space of worship.

One Shabbat evening, I was speaking in the sanctuary, and I heard a slight echo in my voice. Why was that so? Because most of the time when I lead services in a sacred space, there are human, physical, worshiping bodies to absorb the sound.

Not now. There is an empty sanctuary, and hence, the echoes.

As I write these words, we are deeply involved in planning for the Days of Awe. What makes it so difficult is the sheer lack of a physical congregation, and the act of imagining your presence.

So, how do you pray without a synagogue?

It turns out that our sages of old imagined exactly such a situation.

Consider this midrash:

"God said to Israel: 'I asked you to pray in the synagogue of your city, but if you cannot pray in the synagogue, pray outdoors in an open field; and if you cannot pray in the field, pray in the shelter of your home; and if you cannot pray in your home, pray in the darkness of your bed; and if you cannot pray on your bed, meditate in your heart without words."

How often I hear people saying, "I don't need a synagogue; I can pray anywhere!" Yes, you can – even in your heart without words. But, that is if you "cannot" pray in the synagogue — that sacred, communal location would seem to be the "preferred" location.

Here is what we have learned in the last six months. We have learned, or re-learned, to pray in places other than our public spaces. And yet, how deeply we miss being together.

Life is without people, as the old saying would put it. There will come a time when we will be back together.

Or, so we pray.

# Religious School Jackie Klein, Religious School & Youth Programming Director

Throughout the month of Elul, traditionally Jews blow the shofar every day as a way to awaken us to the introspective season. It is very much an individual process. However, even with customs that are focused on individuality, the Jewish tradition encourages this to be done within a community and not in isolation. The prayers that are said throughout this introspective season notoriously speak of various sins that we might need forgiveness for. These prayers are sung in services from the beginning of *Selichot*, which for some starts with Elul weeks before the Saturday night *Selichot* service. Those prayers that ask for forgiveness are never said in first-person, instead, they are always said in the first-person plural, in other words, as a community.

I have been tutoring students throughout the summer. However, there is nothing like the first community get-together in a year, as it is like one giant reunion. At Temple Israel, we had about 6 students join Rabbi Salkin and me to help blow the shofar for High Holy Days service viewing. The students hopped onto Zoom and each had a turn to blow a *Tekiah Gedola* as well as share a little bit about their Jewish heroes and values. There were laughter and smiles all around. It was truly inspirational to see how much our students value being part of the Jewish community. The resounding common response to Rabbi Salkin's question of what should people know about Temple Israel was "everyone is just so nice" and "I feel welcomed here." That, my friends, is one goal I hope we are all very proud of. We may be starting our year off via Zoom, but we certainly will still very much be a close community.

Our Youth Calendar is full of activities, both informal and formal!






## RELIGIOUS SCHOOL & YOUTH GROUP - TEACHERS & MADRICHIM

Rabbi Salkin led our teachers in a text study where they also learned how to use many features of Zoom including how to annotate text for all to see.






Rabbi Salkin and Jackie Klein recorded our students blowing the Shofar in preparation for the High Holy Days.

Our Social Action Committee met in August to discuss potential projects for the upcoming year. As with all other TI activities, COVID 19 has impacted the nature and extent of our programming. In the next months, we will be putting our efforts into the Get Out the Vote (GOTV) initiative with our members continuing to address Vote By Mail postcards and assisting at the polls.

One area of ballot confusion that might arise is with the **OLD** AMENDMENT 4 (regarding felon restoration rights) and the NEW AMENDMENT 4 which deals with process for approval of constitutional amendments. The OLD AMENDMENT 4, which was approved by the voters in 2019, is facing challenges in the courts. This is NOT the Amendment 4 that is on the ballot this year. Please be mindful of this as you vote.

Given the importance of current racial challenges facing the nation, a small subcommittee will be looking at possible educational and advocacy responses that might be appropriate for Temple Israel to engage in. Anyone interested in helping in this area should contact Mary Arpe at mcarpe@gmail.com.

## The Mussar Moment

I began to journal again last month. That means I began to write something down every day that reflected my mood, my hopes, my fears, my interactions with people, my spiritual settings and more. I don't want you to think "heavy" here. I would rather you focus on the word "again". Journaling is an on again/off again enterprise of mine related in many ways to Mussar and this is our season of new beginnings.

In a Jewish context, journaling is self-reflective. It is taking stock of yourself and where you are in relation to where you would like to be. It is less about your bank account and more about how you account for your behavior, actions, relationships. Of course, being stuck in the house and limiting your interpersonal activities, trying to stay safe, makes all this narrower in focus, but still I try. I try to look at the spiritual traits within me that I need to work on. In the Mussar world, we call them soul -traits.

They are challenges to our sense of well-being. For most of us they keep repeating. For me it is patience and honor. (Just to name a few.) Sometimes it's a kind of inability to wait for the "game" to play out or it is the quick quip to someone I love and not allowing them to know how much I appreciate their efforts. And all of this is part of my spiritual exercise to become a better person. To bring in the New Year as a soul on a journey toward self-awareness and self-appreciation.

So this is my thought for our new year and new moment. It comes out of my journaling exercise. As hard as it might seem this year, when we say *Shanah Tovah* to each other, let us focus on the "*Tovah*" – the good. Let us find the goodness in ourselves and in each other no matter how hard and different this year is and has been. May we find the best within and lift up the sparks of hope and holiness hidden in the deeds and desires of our days. *Shanah Tovah*.


A student of Mussar is someone who wants to change, to become the best possible version of the unique individual he or she already is. In the remarkable words of one of the leaders of the Mussar movement, Rabbi Nosson Tzvi Finkel, known as the Alter of Slabodka: "Working to perfect oneself is the cornerstone of all Jewish living..."

Given the extraordinary times in which we are living, our six sessions of Mussar will focus on teachings that help us to "build muscle" to better manage the inevitable times of crisis that come into our lives. In the Mussar view, life is a curriculum with lessons that teach us who we are and who we may become. We will study *middot* (soul traits) such as Sadness, Equanimity, Gratitude, Patience, Faith and Trust to assist us in navigating this journey. This class will draw upon the wisdom of the Mussar Institute and is open to all who are willing to study themselves in light of our spiritual traditions.

Rabbi Howard Shapiro is the Rabbi Emeritus of Temple Israel and has been trained in the art of Jewish Spiritual Direction. He was the coordinator of the Institute of Jewish Spirituality at the Mandel JCC when he first retired and has consulted for our Jewish Federation of Palm Beach on their Synagogue Institute. He teaches Mussar (Jewish Spirituality and Ethics) at Temple Israel and is active in our community.

Dr. Barry Horowitz is a local physician and has been a Temple Israel member for almost 25 years. He has studied and practiced Mussar for many years and is a graduate of the Mussar Institute's Manchim course, which teaches how to facilitate a Mussar group. Dr. Horowitz has facilitated similar courses of study and has taught classes on the classic Mussar text, *Shaarei Yosher*.

# **An Appeal From Don Carter**

Dear Friends,

L'shana Tovah. If you are reading this New Year's greeting, I hope you will agree that you and your family have much to be thankful for. In a year that saw nearly 200,000 Americans lose their lives to a pandemic, few of us have been untouched by this scourge. All of us have seen our lives turned upside down in ways not experienced since WWII. But now that you and your loved ones have survived, now is the time to give thanks to God, give thanks to your Temple family and acknowledge the simple fact that your Jewish life survives only with the help of your fellow congregants and Temple Israel. And Temple Israel survives only with the financial assistance of its member families.

Early into the pandemic, your Board recognized the challenges that our Temple would face in an era of suspended personal contact and initiated Zoom Shabbat services. Add to that the introduction of our wonderful new Rabbi Salkin and guest Cantors and new professional staff in the office. How would we survive in a time of business interruption and high unemployment? Your board acted quickly by doubling down on our efforts to communicate with congregants. By securing the services of Rabbi Salkin. By having almost daily Zoom meetings. Personally, I wanted to help blunt the financial effects the pandemic would have on the temple. So I came up with the "Six Feet of Togetherness Challenge." In addition to obeying the mandate of separating by six feet, I challenged all of you to come together and donate \$25,000 to help our Temple get through this period. I am so confident you will see the importance of donating now, that I gave my matching gift of \$25,000 before one dollar came in from the congregation.

Since we are not holding some of our regular fund-raising events this year, it is important that you give consideration to both the Carter Challenge and our traditional High Holiday Appeal. I give above my President's Circle commitment because I am profoundly moved by the sermons of Rabbi Salkin, by the dedication of our temple leadership and professional staff and by the beautiful Shabbat services.

Please join me by responding to the Carter Challenge and by giving to the Annual Appeal. There is a reason Temple Israel is almost 100 years old and that reason is congregational support. Your support is greatly needed and we are very grateful for each and everyone's participation. We look forward to November 6<sup>th</sup> and sharing a wonderful evening with you.




Our President's Circle Display, proudly mounted in our List Lobby, will soon be updated to reflect the generosity of all of its members.



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
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
