From the President

Marty List

The following is what I presented to our congregation at Yom Kippur, an important message which I feel is imperative to share with all.

In synagogues all over the country on Yom Kippur, the temple president or another respected leader addresses the assembled congregation and asks everyone to dig deep and support the annual high holy day appeal – I'm sure that is written in B'reisheit just before God rested after a busy first week... or it must be one of the 613 commandments! While I will follow through with tradition, I have a second important message to discuss with you.

For almost 100 years, Temple Israel has been the beacon for Reform Jews in the Palm Beaches. It has nurtured many thousands of Jewish families who called this area “home”, offered support and sustenance through war, famine, depression, good times and bad, happy times and sad; Temple Israel has been here for all who want to connect to their Jewish identity with greater flexibility in worship and education. And as the Palm Beaches grew, so did Temple Israel. But Temple Israel was never about its physical structures. The strength of Temple Israel has always been its members – young or old, our members have always loved being involved with the people who call Temple Israel home – worshiping, studying, socializing, and making a difference in our community together.

In the last two years, COVID has dramatically altered our relationships – personal, social and religious. I have heard from many congregants who “lament” that they have not been able to return to worship or participate with in-person activities at Temple. Some are fearful for their health – others just haven't gotten comfortable with the idea of getting together with larger groups of people yet. Everyone is dealing with PTSD related to COVID fatigue and stress and, of course, trying to figure out whether zooming in and out of meetings, birthday parties, and other events is being social, or anti-social.

As you might expect, our Board and I have been very concerned that we have not been able to run most of our activities, programs or fundraising events for the last two years and yes, that has put a great deal of financial stress on us. But I stand before you today a changed and optimistic man. You have continued to make supporting Temple Israel an important part of your philanthropy. We have the largest number of members in the Presidents' Circle in our history and more of you are choosing to make a testamentary bequest to Temple Israel through our Life and Legacy Endowment Program. However, the financial hole in our budget remains larger than ever and we must ask that you help us meet the challenge to raise substantially more during this High Holy Day appeal by making a new or increased gift. In advance, let me say THANK YOU!

Now, with that part of the business out of the way, I would like to present my second “ASK”. I know that everyone is looking forward to returning to the sanctuary and to our regular activities soon and, of course, we are here for you when you are ready.

As we emerge from our COVID cocoons and re-enter communal life and society, we know that many of us will have different expectations and needs. We want to know how these last couple of years may have altered how you choose to express your Jewish identity and what you want from or how you wish to engage with Temple Israel.

Temple Israel is committed to remaining the beacon of Reform Judaism in the Palm Beaches for the next 100 years – please help us by taking an active role in shaping the future and keeping Temple Israel relevant. I will be asking members of our executive committee and Board to call everyone in the congregation to start the conversation.

Answering the call to open your wallet helps us meet Temple Israel's operational needs today but opening your heart and sharing your thoughts will help Temple Israel meet the Reform Jewish community's future needs. Thank you for your commitment to support Temple Israel in both ways!

From the Executive Director

Harry Weiss, a family friend, owned a ladies undergarment store on the Lower East Side of NYC along the bustling Orchard Street where people would *shlep* on a Sunday morning to *hondle* for *metzie* (bargains) and enjoy hot pastrami and a knish at Katz's Delicatessen. For those not familiar with the Lower East Side, this is where you would get anything from the best pickles to a fancy fur coat and everything in between. Wholesalers and retailers alike would be pushing racks of clothes, delivering boxes of *tchotchkes* and taking orders for custom *yarmulkes*. The streets were filled with businessmen, shoppers and tourists, and men were seen with *shtreimel* and long black suits while others were in secular clothing mesmerized by the hustle and bustle and feeling *ferklemp* from all the shopping.

Back to Harry. Eventually the Lower East Side became less populated and Harry decided to move his home and business to Cedarhurst, Long Island, which was becoming more and more an Orthodox community. His new routine required a daily deposit to the bank which was several blocks away. This might seem ordinary for a business owner but Harry had been legally blind for many years. He had excelled in business with the physical help of his wife and an assistant. Here was a man who saw only shadows and yet was walking alone along the heavily travelled streets of his town with considerable money in his bags. But he survived with *sechel* – he knew the upper light was red and when the flashes of shadows had stopped, this would be the time to cross the street.

One day a young lady saw him waiting at the light with his walking stick. She asked if he needed help crossing the street. Although Harry would normally say no thanks, this time he said yes. The young lady slowly and safely guided Harry to the other side of the street and he thanked her profusely.

When asked why he had accepted help this time – so uncommon for him – Harry replied, “it was a double *mitzvah*. She thought it was a *mitzvah* that she was helping me, but it was ME who had the *mitzvah* of letting her feel good about herself and her good deed.”

I was thinking of Harry during our High Holy Days this year. As I sat at the Social Hall registration or checked with the Sound Room, as I made sure the attendance lists were updated, as I monitored our livestream and Zoom, and as I brought snacks to our lobby for after Rosh Hashanah services and N'ilah... I was quite aware that I was not at the High Holy Days services – something that I have always attended and cherished. This for me, as it was for Harry, was a *mitzvah*. For me, I was doing the utmost a Jew can do during the High Holy Days – I enabled others to *daven*, to celebrate, to partake. And I have no qualms or regrets about this. Thank you for allowing me to provide these holy days for you, for allowing me to do this *mitzvah*.

The *Mussar* Moment

Rabbi Shlomo Wolbe (1914-2005), the great Mussar master of our generation, writes about the Mussar path:

לא המבט אחורנית יתקן האדם אלא המבט **קדימה**
*Lo ha'mabat achoranit yitaken ha'adam, elah ha'mabat **kadima***

It is not looking back that repairs a person, rather it is looking forward. [3]

Rabbi Wolbe explains that the foundation of Mussar wisdom and practice is to be aware of your present self while constantly having your vision looking ahead, to change what you have identified as being out of balance. From this perspective, how we got to where we are now is less significant; it is where we are going that is our primary focus. We have to know that we can change, and we have to always be looking to make small steps in the right direction.

This teaching from The Mussar Institute's Elul course, written by its director Avi Fertig, is a profound lesson not only for the New Year, but for life in general. He continues: "This teaching further illustrates that the point of looking to the future is not only to actualize the change, but that the very process of focusing on change, desiring it, verbalizing your desire, and longing for the time when the change is possible in action, is of supreme value. Creating a clear vision and *working towards* change is itself an essential aspect of inner growth."

The goals you set must be very attainable for you. If they are too much of a challenge, there will be too great a risk of failure or despair, which will inevitably send your spiritual life into reverse drive. Conversely, if they are too easy, there will be no stretch involved. The idea is to address change progressively. Rabbi Micha Berger summarizes this nicely: "It is key to focus on building what isn't there rather than tearing down faults." Doing so, with the help of the Blessed One Above, will assist you on your path toward greater wholeness and holiness.

In the remarkable words of one of the leaders of the Mussar movement, Rabbi Nosson Tzvi Finkel, known as the Alter of Slabodka: "Working to perfect oneself is the cornerstone of all Jewish living..."



Given the divisive times in which we are living, our six sessions of Mussar will focus on teachings that address attitudes and behaviors which can impede our ability to open our hearts to others. We will study middot (soul traits) such as Anger, Envy, Judgment, Falsehood, Arrogance and Stubbornness to assist us in navigating this journey. This class will draw upon the wisdom of the Mussar Institute and is open to all who are willing to study themselves in light of our spiritual traditions.

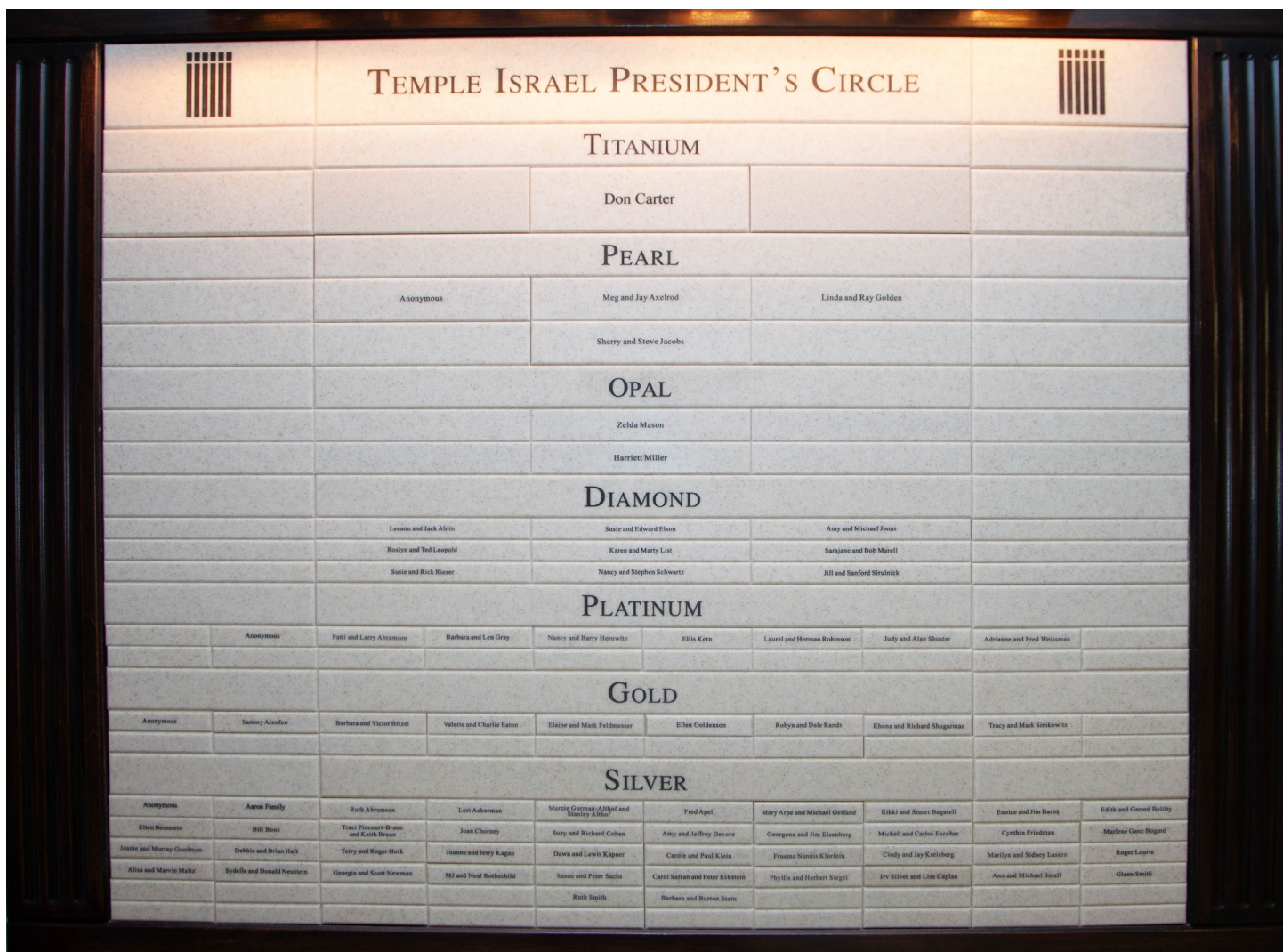

I was privileged to spend all of the High Holy Days on the *bima* at Temple Israel, mostly as a “*gabbaï*” to move the Powerpoint along and also to lead Family Services.

Rosh Hashanah services was certainly lovely but I had a special view on Yom Kippur that few people get to have in a congregation. During *Ashamnu*, I looked up and saw our congregation tapping their heart – the traditional action we Jews do when confessing our sins, so poignant.

This year was like none other in that our decision to have in-person services hinged upon the changing Covid statistics and the views of our congregants. I am so thankful to our medical task force and our commitment to a masked community that we were able to gather safely even though limited, especially as this created the opportunity for me to see this one touching moment.

Seeing so many of our community use this physical ritual in such a natural way – including teens and teens at heart – was inspiring. Some wore *tallit* and some did not. Some wore *kippot* and others didn't. The diversity of the Jewish people was right in front me and that too was inspiring.

I know many participated online and could not witness everything that those in attendance did. And so I offer this glimpse of my in-person experiences for those who were not physically with us this year, with the hope to have us all experience the High Holy Days together next year in person. We may need to continue our hybrid services for a while but we are hoping to return to “normal” as soon as possible. As the prayer says, “return again, return again, return to the land of your soul” (and, in our case, returning to Temple.)

As your dedicated youth professional, I bless us that in future years we will be able to safely have many more with us including our youngest participants at both our family and traditional services.

On that note, I'm excited that we were able to have outdoor experiences for families during Sukkot, Simchat Torah, our Consecration of New Students and our first Family Shabbat of the new year (mostly in the *sukkah*). Emily Aronoff, our Community Education Specialist, was amazing at helping us to plan these events and was so energetic with her music.

May we all be inscribed in the book of life and have a happy and healthy year ahead.

We are so excited to join forces with Alpert Jewish Family Service to help facilitate learning about food insecurity and to provide much-needed food donations to our community.

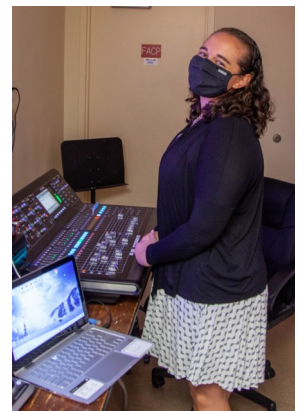
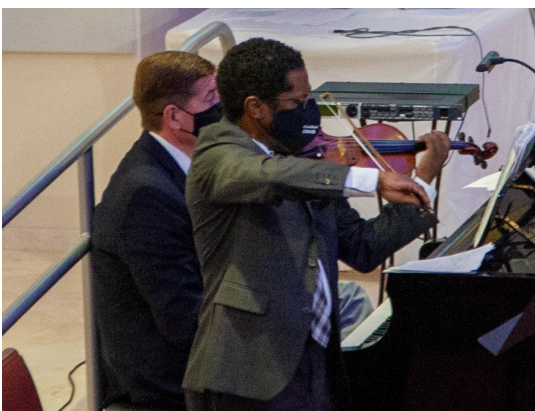

First Day of Religious School

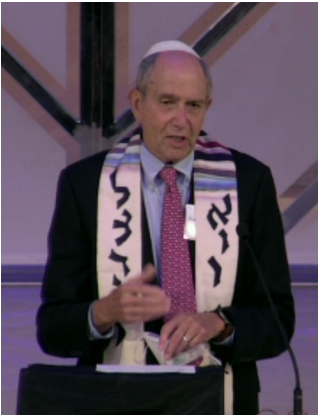
