# From our President Charlie Eaton, Co-President

It is an exciting time to begin a term as Temple Israel Co-President! Marty List has worked hard as Temple Israel's president for the last three years, developing strategies to solve major challenges. Under his guidance, TI is emerging from a long period of financial, clergy and administrative uncertainties. Temple Israel is now forging a new path of transformation and expansion. I am honored to work closely with Marty on this bold and innovative plan. Our goal is for Temple Israel to be a beacon for Reform Judaism in South Florida and beyond.

#### **New Rabbis**

We've been very fortunate to have Rabbi Salkin as our brilliant interim Rabbi for the last three years in anticipation of a newly seated Rabbi. After two years of Search Committee work, something remarkable happened. We received an application from a Rabbinic married couple serving two separate congregations near Chicago. Rabbi Ryan Daniels is Associate Rabbi at North Shore Congregation Israel in Glencoe, Illinois, where he has served for the last seven years. Rabbi Carlie Daniels is the Acting Senior Rabbi at Temple Sukkat Shalom in Wilmette, Illinois, where she has served for the last six years. They have a young family and planned to move on from their congregations to their final career positions at a temple with rich possibilities. They represent the demographic of congregants we need to bring to Temple Israel.

Two Rabbis? Yes, two Rabbis. We were looking for one Rabbi but we're also at a transformative point in the history of Temple Israel. Our goals are to grow our temple and to create a Jewish Cultural Center of the Palm Beaches, a new model to enrich and expand the Jewish world in South Florida. This project is complex and groundbreaking. It justifies the expertise of two co-Rabbis (and two co-presidents!) This is the type of situation the Daniels were seeking and their talents and experience match our needs.

The Rabbinic Search Committee voted unanimously to recommend these Rabbis to the Board of Trustees, who voted unanimously to extend an employment offer, which received a unanimous vote of acceptance at our special congregational meeting on February 13.

Rabbis Daniels will officially begin their Temple Israel tenure on July 1, 2023. They are already working with Temple Israel lay leadership, clergy, and staff for the transition process, including plans for in-person visits before July.

#### Our Future is Bright

As we celebrate our centennial this year, we also look toward our future. We are finalizing plans to re-envision and rebuild Temple Israel to better meet the needs of families in the Palm Beaches, especially with consideration of the city's local revitalization plans. Our plans will enable Temple Israel to be financially healthy with increased membership and significant program offerings. Strong partnerships with the Jewish Federation of Palm Beach County, Mandel JCC and others – as well as tenacious leadership by our lay leaders and clergy – will enable us to provide educational, cultural, and religious programming for our extended community through a new cultural center. While this is our aspiration, we need your inspiration and perspiration to make all of this a success. Our plans require patience, persistence and proper planning but in the long run, we will be stronger as a Temple and as a community. We will keep our congregation apprised as plans are finalized but our dream will be a reality soon.

We are family. We are strong. We will persist - and we will thrive. We are Temple Israel.



#### From our Rabbi Rabbi Jeffrey Salkin

#### Temple Israel at One Hundred Years: Looking Back

As I contemplate the one-hundredth anniversary of Temple Israel, I have been wishing that I could time travel back to that moment in 1923, when a small group of businessmen and pioneers first created this congregation.

Their Judaism was classical Reform Judaism, and even though the Reform movement has moved beyond that religious expression, and even though I identify with the more traditional wing of the Reform movement, I want to give classical Reform Jews the credit that they deserve. Because they were right about many things, there are things that we should remember if we want our Reform Judaism to truly be the Judaism of the future

**Classical Reform Judaism had standards**. Classical Reform Judaism never would have dreamed that it would have been the religion for Jews who wanted less. Classical Reform Judaism was a religion for serious Jews. Those people who believe that classical Reform Judaism was assimilationist are misreading the subtleties of history.

The late Rabbi Arnold Jacob Wolf of Chicago, a third-generation Reform Jew, reminisced about his classical Reform grandmother. She would never have refrained from fasting on Yom Kippur. She would never have eaten bread on Pesach.

True – her repertoire of *mitzvot* may have been smaller than ours is now. But no classical Reform Jew would have said: "I don't have to do that. I'm Reformed." No classical Reform Jew would have said: "I don't have to know that. I'm Reformed."

I have invented a parlor game for today's Reform Jews: Tell me why you are a Reform Jew – and you are not allowed to use any negative words in your answer. Don't tell me what Reform Judaism isn't, or says you don't have to do, or says you don't have to believe. A negative Judaism is a thin gruel upon which to feast. A negative Judaism creates negative Jews. We need a positive Judaism that will create positive Jews.

The old Reform Judaism had intellectual depth. Classical Reform Jews, particularly those with a German Jewish orientation, saw themselves as being intellectually adept and enlightened. Their rabbis reflected that self-image. The first generation of American Reform rabbis was invariably of German/central European background, and many of them had PhDs, or might have feigned that degree. Hence, the popular form of address for rabbis was "Doctor," causing one wag to quip: "The Jewish people were healthy until its rabbis became doctors."

**Classical Reform Jews believed.** They had a real theology that had real integrity. Our Reform ancestors possessed genuine piety. In the words of the old hymn: "God was in His [sorry, yes, always His] holy temple. Earthly thoughts be silent now." Those thoughts did, in fact, become silent.

Think of that scene in "Driving Miss Daisy" that showed Miss Daisy singing "Ein Keloheinu" at the end of the Shabbat morning service at The Temple in Atlanta. She might not have davened at a shul on Shabbos. But, she went to temple on Saturday, or what she might have called the Sabbath. That was her *minhag*.

Reform Jews had a real religious commitment — yes, perhaps to a smaller book, and perhaps to a smaller service. But nevertheless, to use the rabbinic phrase, "The heart was inclined towards heaven." They wanted their prayers to be intellectually true and emotionally meaningful. Which is why it is not altogether absurd to say that those who were in the pews back then were davening with Miss Daisy. They would not have called it that. But davening means regular and heartfelt prayer — yes, they were davening.

Moreover, classical Reform Jews believed in decorum. They believed that the way we behave in synagogue should be different from the way we behave in the football stadium.

Classical Reform Judaism knew what it wanted. Judaism had a mission: to bring the world to ethical monotheism. That was the Jewish mission to the world. Social action is the child of that theology. Reform Jews took the exhortation of Isaiah seriously: "It is too little that you should be My servant, in that I raise up the tribes of Jacob and restore the survivors of Israel: I will also make you a light to the nations, that my salvation may reach the ends of the earth."

Classical Reform Jews believed that they had a role in addressing inequity in their society. From the "Pittsburgh Platform":

"In full accordance with the spirit of the Mosaic legislation, which strives to regulate the relations between rich and poor, we deem it our duty to participate in the great task of modern times, to solve, on the basis of justice and righteousness, the problems presented by the contrasts and evils of the present organization of society."

In his song "Prayer of the Secular," the Israeli rock musician Kobi Oz looks at various Jewish religious communities, and asks hard questions about them.

He looks at a Reform Jew, and he asks himself: "Does this Reform Jew have a different book, or does he simply have a book with a brand new cover?"

He is asking: is Reform Judaism a brand new religion, utterly unmoored from its past? Is it a different version of (whatever we imagine the "old religion" to have been), with a different presentation and packaging? A combination of the two? Something else entirely?

That answer is now up to the coming generations.

#### **Jewish Education: Timeless and Ageless**

Growing up in a family with a single parent who was not a warm presence in my life, and two older sisters who were extremely older than I, I found the Temple to be my happy place. I was one of those weird kids who couldn't wait to go to Hebrew School, religious school, choir practice, etc. If I wasn't at Rabbi Klein's children's home for dance classes, I was at the temple.

Just to clarify, we sat behind single desks and the teaching was all frontal. No arts and crafts, no special programs, just learning Hebrew and holidays and history. That was it. And I loved it.

Today, I think if we put our kids at single desks and did all frontal teaching, our kids would run out of the building and never come back. Who does that anymore?

Not too many people are thankful for the pandemic. However, for educators and teachers, it gave us the opportunity to take classes virtually and literally free of charge with some of the most learned authors and educators in our field. I have notebooks full of information on the changing of the field of Jewish Education.

# The Mussar Moment Barry Horowitz, M.D.

My longtime trainer recently told me a story. He was working out at the gym on a particular piece of equipment and had to use the restroom. Upon his return, another man had started using the machine he was on. My trainer politely asked if he could work in with him, to which to man replied: "No, it will mess up my workout." The man proceeded to lecture my trainer that he should have left a towel on the machine and how he was not going to lose his "pump" and ultimately would not relent.

Now, it would be easy to say "What a (fill in an expletive deleted)" and argue with the guy. But, is there a way to react and respond to such a situation that is better for the situation, better for the other person and ultimately better for ourselves? I am reminded of the frat house bedroom scene in the movie Animal House. Without going into details, it is the scene where Pinto has an angel on one shoulder and the devil on the other, each goading him into taking a different path.

The Jewish sages give a name to this negative impulse, this "devil." They call it the *yetzer ha'ra* or the evil inclination. We all have this inclination and it challenges us, which is why it exists. We are born with free will and can choose to do good or bad, but whenever we try to do something that stretches us in the direction of good, we need to expect to encounter this inner resistance arising from the shadows.

We might think of *yetzer hara*-based thoughts as originating in the amygdala, the "alarm system" aspect of our brain designed to promote our survival. In this sense, the *yetzer hara* is not "bad," but rather simply subject to over-functioning in a given situation. So, we are encouraged not to avoid or repress it, but rather to meet it with non-judgmental curiosity and compassion. By inserting even a bit of space between ourselves and our fear-based instincts, we can become clear-minded enough to discern the extent of actual threat, and extract the spark of holy light trapped within a *klippah*, a broken shard of Creation.

So, we can learn from situations like the one my trainer faced in the gym that witnessing distorting anger in the face of others can serve to remind us of our own capacity to become lost in fury. Rather than ignore this unavoidable capacity within ourselves, we acknowledge it honestly and extract from our anger the energy we need to generate powerful words and actions by which we can repair, bless, and elevate ourselves and others. Moreover, we can recognize our capacity to search our shadows honestly and with compassion to discover within them unnoticed reserves of strength by which we can resist ignorance, hatred and violence.

#### SOCIAL ACTION CENTENNIAL MITZVOT

During our Centennial year, we will be highlighting volunteer opportunities in our community. We hope you will find some that interest you. We would also like to hear from our congregants about their volunteer outreach experiences.

#### **Kosher Food Pantry**

Albert Jewish Family Service currently has two Kosher food pantries with locations in West Palm Beach and Boynton Beach. The pantries provide non-perishable Kosher food, household necessities and personal hygiene products.

#### The Kind Kitchen

This organization is dedicated to helping others, whomever they may be. The Kind Kitchen started in 1987 sending out small amounts of meals. Now, with a staff of 4 and an army of dedicated volunteers, they send out over 2100 meals every month and growing rapidly.

#### **Literacy Program**

Anne and Sam Klein Literacy Program is in its 21<sup>st</sup> year. The program offers 3 ways to connect with elementary school students in our community:

#### **Reading Express**

During select months, groups of volunteers visit a school, with each volunteer bringing a new book to be left with the class. The volunteers read and share the book with small groups or individual children.

#### **Reading Together**

This program is for volunteers who prefer to work with individual children and is a 30-minute-perweek commitment.

#### **Project Specialist**

Volunteers all come with specialties. The plan is to create a database of specialist volunteers. Project Specialists offer their time and talents for short periods to help with areas like frame, music, writing, illustration, etc. For more information about this program, contact (561) 242-6651.





#### JEWISH LOVE WINS BY VERA DECHALAMBERT

Saturday, February 11<sup>th</sup>, was the greatest day in my family's memory. My youngest son, Noah, became a bar mitzvah. For my family, this day was an experience of profound intergenerational healing. Noah is the first in at least 4 generations of men in my family to read from the Torah. On his bar mitzvah day, he chanted not only for himself but for all his ancestors who, because of oppression and



persecution, were never able to read the Torah or to have a Jewish education. Such was the fate for most Soviet Jews.

My family and I came to the United States in 1993 as Jewish political refugees. Like all Jews at the time, we were running from systemic Soviet antisemitism. We arrived from the newly independent Ukraine right after the fall of the Soviet Union. In a way, Noah is a testament to the efforts of the American Jewish community that worked tirelessly to bring Former Soviet Jews to America. I am delighted that many of these faces were in the audience with us for Noah's special day. Our dear family friend Mania, a Holocaust survivor who watched as the Nazis killed her father and brother in Ukraine and who spent much of the war hiding in a field with her sister, undressed the Torah. The strongest Ukrainian Jew I know, Vlad, had the honor of lifting the Torah and his wife Irina dressed it. For us, Ukrainian Jews having any contact with the Torah at all is not a common thing. Noah got to do what so many of them and their ancestors never had an opportunity to do – not only to read from the Torah but to know and love Judaism. As Noah chanted his Torah portion, there was not a dry eye in the house. He stood at the Torah for all of them, and their hearts spilled into our sanctuary.

On that day, Noah had the great honor of reading from a restored Holocaust Torah. As a daughter of a Holocaust survivor, nothing could have been more meaningful to me. I know wherever he is, my father of blessed memory was *kvelling*.

Noah is an heir of an uneasy history. My father, David Giller, was named after his grandfather who was one of the only Jewish merchants of Kiev. When the Bolsheviks came to power, he went to them and willingly surrendered all his factories and properties and asked for a floor in one of his own buildings for his very large family to live. The house shared a wall with the famous house of Bulgakov in Kiev. They lived there until they left for Babiy Yar, the biggest mass killing of Jews in the territories of the former Soviet Union. Against all odds, my dad escaped with his mother on the last train out of Kiev. And as if to complete some terrible symmetry, on my mother's side, her dad was Armenian, a family not untouched by the Armenian genocide, a tragedy that would become Hitler's inspiration for his plan for the Jews. In his moving sermon, Rabbi Salkin said, "Noah is a raised fist in the face of Stalin and Hitler." This image gives me such joy. Noah is a testament to life in the face of genocides. Proof that Jewish love wins.

I cannot help but marvel at the miracle Noah's bar mitzvah was. It felt like a deep healing and restoration for an unlikely lineage, an answered prayer for generations of our ancestors. Noah is the dream of his ancestors: a proud Ukrainian Jew receiving the Torah. I couldn't feel prouder of my son who stepped into his Jewish leadership that day. Or more grateful for being a part of the Temple Israel community that has helped bring him through this holy threshold: Rabbi Salkin whose love for Judaism now lives in Noah's heart, Cantorial Soloist Suzanne Guinane whose passion and patience kindled Noah's gift for chanting Torah, our amazing new Director of Education Beth who has supported every part of the process with so much care, Tamekia who is the force of relentless service and rare grace which brought everything together, Karen who is the hidden *tsadik* of this world and the archangel of that day and our community, and all of you who have so generously welcomed our family to your shul. Words cannot express my gratitude. My heart overflows.







