Counting Up to Shavuot

On the second night of *Pesach*, we begin counting the *Omer*, the 49 days between *Pesach* and *Shavuot*, with *Shavuot* on the fiftieth day.

S'firat HaOmer Niggun, https://youtu.be/S8hCiPI1tMQ, was written by my friend Rabbi Yosef Goldman with Rabbis Shira Yaakov Feit and Zach Fredman in 2012 on a Friday afternoon as they prepared to co-lead *Kabbalat Shabbat* at *Romemu* in New York. This beautiful blessing was later recorded on April 2, 2019 at the Germantown Jewish Centre in Philadelphia with Rabbi Yosef Goldman, Rabbi Deborah Sacks Mintz, Chava Mirel and Joey Weisenberg for Hadar's Rising Song Institute.

The words for *S'firat HaOmer Niggun* are taken from our liturgy and appear in our *Mishkan T'filah* before *Aleinu* for *Erev Shabbat* Services. (Please see the Table of Contents of your *Mishkan T'filah* edition for the page number.) It provides us an opportunity to focus and express our intention to serve G-d by increasing Divine Presence in the world through our actions – unifying the earthly and heavenly manifestation of G-d, the material and the physical:

לְשֵׁם יִחוּד קּוּדְשָׁא בְּרִיךְ הוּא וּשְׁכִינְתֵּיהּ הָנְּנִי מוּכָן וּמְזֻמָּן לְקַיֵּם מִצְוַת עֲשֵׂה שָׁל סְפִירַת הָעֹמֶר יישׁבַע שַׁבַּתוֹת תִּמִימוֹת תָּהִיינָה:׳׳׳...

L'sheim yichud Kud'sha B'rich Hu ush'kinteih

Hin'ni muchan um'zuman l'kayeim mitzvat asei shel s'firat haomer.

Baruch atah, Adonai Eloheinu, Melech haolam, asher kid'shanu b'mitzvotav v'tzivanu al s'firat haomer.

For the sake of the unification of the transcendent creative power with the Divine Presence dwelling here and now.

I am here, I am ready to fulfill the *mitzvah* of counting the *Omer*.

"....Seven weeks. They must be complete...." (Leviticus 23:15 – 16)

Blessed are you, *Adonai*, Sovereign of the universe, who hallows us with *mitzvot*, commanding us to count the *Omer*.

In addition to counting the *Omer* each night, I also embrace the opportunity to grow spiritually with daily readings by Rabbi Karen Kedar, Rabbi Jill Zimmerman, Rabbi Yael Levy and/or Rabbi Matthew Ponak and Omer Counters group on Facebook.

May we all embrace the opportunities to continue elevating ourselves to receive the gift of *Torah*, once again, with our ancestors and in performing the *mitzvah* of counting the *Omer* also fulfill the *mitzvah* of *tikkun olam* (repairing the world).

Unfinished Business

One of the most beautiful cities that I have ever visited is the city of Barcelona, the capital of the region of Catalonia in Spain. It is a city that is rich in Jewish history – the site of an infamous disputation between Jews and Christians during the Middle Ages.

But, this travelogue about Barcelona is not about the Jewish sites of Barcelona. Rather, it is a reflection on the work of the great architect Antoni Gaudi, who lived in Barcelona from 1852 to 1926.

Gaudi's architectural style is wild and imaginative and colorful. When you go to Barcelona, you can visit the houses that he designed, as well as a huge and beautiful park.

Gaudi's undisputed masterpiece is the huge church known as the Sagrada Familia, the church of the holy family.

Gaudi began working on the Sagrada Familia in 1883 – exactly one hundred and forty years ago.

From the very beginning of the project, Gaudi said that it would take at least a hundred and fifty years, and maybe more, to finish this work.

He knew that he would not be able to complete this project, but he died with the faith that after his departure from this earth, there would be those who would take up his work, and that eventually the work would be finished.

Apparently, the work is on schedule. They say that it will be finished sometime around the year 2026.

To me, the most beautiful thing about visiting the Sagrada Familia is looking at the workers, the artisans and the various sculptors and builders. Each goes about his or her craft.

And when you look at them working, you see that upon their faces there is a calm, loving, almost beatific look – because they know that they are not merely building a building.

They know that they are building a cathedral. They know that they are building something holy. They know that they will most likely not be around to see the work finished – but by taking part in this work, they are dipping their hands into eternity itself.

This is about the unfinished cathedrals of our lives, about the work that we begin and never get around to completing.

Judaism places before us a history of unfinished work.

Moses never got to finish his work. God barred him from entering the Land of Israel – because of Moses' temper. Moses died on Mount Nebo, on the other side of the Jordan – with God showing him the entire Land of Israel before he died. I cannot believe that the Holy One could be so cruel as to tease Moses with that sight; rather, I suspect that he was showing him the future – a future that his successor Joshua would inherit – as if to say: This will go on. This will endure.

And so, too, with King David. David had wanted to build a Temple to God in Jerusalem, but he could not – because his hands were stained with the blood of his enemies. David had to leave that sacred task to his son, Solomon, who ultimately built the Temple – and built it partially out of his father's disappointments.

And there is yet another example of unfinished work in our tradition. Every Jewish home is supposed to have a small piece on the eastern wall, the part facing Jerusalem, that is left unfinished, unplastered, and unpainted. It reminds us of the destroyed Temple in Jerusalem – that just as it has not been re-built, our own homes can never be totally built. No matter how long we might live in them, they are all works in progress.

The Sages said: It is not incumbent upon you to finish the work, but you are not allowed to abstain from beginning it – and I once thought it to be a cliché, or perhaps an excuse for indolence.

Now, as I approach the final months of my congregational rabbinate, I know that the Sages were right.

Each of us is a work in progress. William Butler Yeats put it this way:

"...that toil of growing up;

The ignominy of boyhood; the distress

Of boyhood changing into man;

The unfinished man and his pain."

Each of us is Gaudi's cathedral – a cathedral of memory that will be built, slowly, over time, and never quite completed.

P.S. One more thing about cathedrals and their construction.

In medieval cathedrals, it was the custom of the workmen to sign their names, if they could, underneath the pews of the cathedrals that they had built.

Now, you might ask: whoever looks beneath the pew? Who would ever see those autographs?

No one.

Only God.

Let us, each of us, remember how we sign the hidden, unseen pieces of the cathedrals that we built out of the tender bricks of our own lives.

The Mussar Moment
Barry Horowitz, M.D.

(adapted from Awareness in Action)

The poet Jane Hirshfield writes that "We feel like separate water droplets – but we are also ocean." Often we see ourselves as drops of water. Separate, powerless, vulnerable. And when we feel isolated or threatened, we become constricted. We get tied up in our own inner knots. And then we crave temporary fixes for our fear and pain. We become self-centered. We act and speak without regard for others, even often the people we love the most. And each of us regrets acting defensively and reactively, blurting out needlessly hurtful words. Yet we seem to fall into the same trap over and over again.

Chesed (lovingkindness) is a spiritual and ethical wakeup call within every one of us. When we're agitated and confused, *chesed* alerts us to the deeper truth that while we're water droplets, we're also ocean. We are profoundly, inextricably connected to a vibrant, complex web of life and love. Most of the time we lose sight of how interconnected we are. That's what makes the *middah* of *chesed* so essential.

It's not always easy to experience this sense of connection. Many of us often feel alone, sometimes profoundly so. Yet each of us can remember, at the very least, that we are connected to our own breath and that our breath connects us with the whole ecosystem. We're connected as well to countless individuals whose lives impact us. Like the people who plant, harvest, deliver and prepare the food that we eat.

If we can apply *hitlamdut*, non-judgmental curiosity, in these frustrating moments, cultivating kind attention and curiosity instead of judgment, we may see more clearly the previously unnoticed inner obstructions which are born of fear and or desire, obstructions which are clogging the channel of *middot* trying to circulate through us. And if we can meet these internal blockages with ease, with *chesed*, instead of judgment, we can create conditions for the obstructions to soften.

Through kind attention rather than harsh judgment, we dissolve these blockages enough to create an opening through which *chesed*, loving connection, can flow through us naturally. If we can do so, we might notice a slight shift, an incremental change within us. We might be surprised to find ourselves able to be just a little bit more generous and patient. We may begin to afford others and ourselves the benefit of the doubt instead of always assuming the worst. We may feel slightly less reactive and slightly more responsive, slightly less defensive and slightly more open. We may notice the *chesed*, the lovingkindness, stored up within us and all around us, finding its way into our actions and our words. As we practice *chesed*, we may feel a little bit less like a drop of water and a little bit more like part of an ocean.

Do not do Rabbi a favor... unless you know for sure it's him asking!

The most recent email said, "Hello, Are you less busy at the moment? I got a request for you to manage discreetly. I will be going into a meeting shortly, please no calls so kindly respond back via email."

If you respond, "Rabbi" will probably ask you to purchase some gift cards for those in need or perhaps a gift to our students or staff (or something to that effect.) While Rabbi Salkin may be kind, he would NEVER ask you to do him such a favor. **This is SPAM! It is not from Rabbi Salkin!** (Had you proceeded to get the gift cards, "Rabbi" would ask for the gift card #s and codes which will enable the con artist to go off on a shopping spree, paying with that info.)

Whenever receiving such as request -- whether from Rabbi or anyone else you know -- chances are that if you put your cursor over the "from" name, the hidden email address will not be Rabbi's or your friend's proper address. It could be similar, but not real. For example, Rabbi Salkin's email address is RabbiSalkin@temple-israel.com and yet the Spam might say RebbeSalkin@wegotyou.com or, in the most recent case, Rabbi.Jewish40@...

But even without checking that out, simply CALL the Rabbi (or anyone else requesting the favor) AND CONFIRM! Do not respond to the email directly - that will lead you back to the imposter. And don't believe that Rabbi (or anyone else) is too busy to be interrupted as the email may indicate. If they truly want the favor, they'll make the time for you.

Please know that our systems remain secure and your personal information is safe with us. There are many ways in which spammers get contacts, but let's try to be alert and not fall for it.

A Farewell Reception for Rabbi Jeffrey Salkin Guest Speaker: Rabbi Dr. Marc Gellman

Rabbi Gellman will be delivering the sermon and paying tribute to Rabbi Jeffrey Salkin during our **June 9**th worship service – a celebration of Rabbi Salkin's tenure as our interim rabbi and to salute his career as he embarks on his retirement from the pulpit.





Rabbi Gellman is the Rabbi Emeritus of Temple Beth Torah in Melville, NY, served as the rabbi of the Aspen Jewish Congregation in Aspen, CO, and also served as president of The New York Board of Rabbis. In 1987, Rabbi Gellman and his friend Monsignor Thomas Hartman formed the media team "The God Squad", reporting religious news for ABC's Good Morning America. They were also regulars on the Imus in the Morning program and hosted their own cable program produced by Telecare of the Diocese of Rockville Centre. In addition, they co-authored a syndicated weekly religious advice column for Tribune Media Content, which Rabbi Gellman continues to write following Father Hartman's death in 2016, appearing locally on Fridays in the Palm Beach Post.

Rabbi Gellman has written ten books for children and adults including "Does God Have a Big Toe?: Stories about stories in the Bible" which was selected by the New York Times as one of the ten best illustrated children's books of the year.


