For the last year, Temple

Its officers are Marty List (Co-President), Charlie Eaton (Co-President), Peter Eckstein (Secretary), Mark Feldmesser (Treasurer), Amy Jonas (Vice President), Barry Horowitz (Vice President), Don Carter (Vice President), Ellen Goldenson (Vice President), Elaine Feldmesser (Immediate Past President), Judy Shuster (Immediate Past President), Michael Jonas (Penultimate Past President), Linda Solomon (Sisterhood President), and Howard Solomon (Brotherhood President). Its current trustees are Andrew Levy, Barbara Brizel, Carlos Escobar, Cindy Kreisberg, Fred Apel, Fred Weissman, Harry Kaufman, Howard Berman, Iris Koller, Jane

Herring, Janice Rosenberg, Jay Axelrod, Lori Ackerman, Pam Wiener, Roger Hork, Terry Resk, and Vera DeChalambert.

Terror in Israel: Navigating These Challenging Times

One of our most beloved professors in rabbinical school was Rabbi Bernard Mehlman, who served for many decades as a pulpit rabbi before teaching us homiletics at HUC-JIR. While serving a congregation in Washington, D.C., Rabbi Mehlman could walk from his home to the synagogue. As he tells it, on his way to work he would pick up the newspaper that was delivered to his front door every morning, and wait to open it until he arrived at his study. One day, when Rabbi Mehlman arrived at his desk and unfurled the newspaper from its packaging, he was flabbergasted by what he read. The date was October 6, 1973. Egypt and Syria had attacked Israel, igniting the Yom Kippur War.

Rabbi Mehlman shared this story as a reminder that no matter how well or far in advance we prepare for an event or worship service – even Yom Kippur! – we must always remain flexible, ready to adapt to the needs of the congregation in an everchanging world. Like so many rabbis on Yom Kippur morning 1973, Rabbi Mehlman discarded the sermon that he had intended to deliver and quickly wrote a new one. Not only did his congregation need to hear a different kind of message that day, but the events of October 6, 1973 changed the world forever. Caught by surprise that morning, a day that Jews should have been lining synagogue pews rather than standing on the frontlines of war, Israel almost immediately suffered unthinkable losses of life, military equipment, and territory, impacting every single Israeli citizen and sending shockwaves around the world.

Fifty years and one day later, on October 7, 2023, we all woke up to the devastating news of the unprecedented, large-scale Hamas terrorist attack on Israel. We first learned of Hamas' brutal assault from social media, scrolling through our Israeli

friends' real-time accounts of the violence and its horrifying toll. We now know that Hamas brutally murdered more than 1,000 adults and children in the first hours of their devastating massacre, kidnapping at least 150 others and destroying homes and livelihoods in our beloved land. A Saturday morning, it began on Shabbat and the holiday of Simchat Torah, a day meant for rejoicing with the community. However, joyful celebrations were cut short because of the horrendous attacks. There was no rejoicing this year.

A question so many of us are asking now is, how can we go on after experiencing such immense trauma? The shock we felt hearing of the initial attacks on innocent lives turned into horror as gruesome details emerged in the days and weeks that followed, and of course the violence continues.

We would like to offer these tips, inspired by a leading Israeli psychologist, to help each of us navigate this difficult time:

1. Demonstrate selfcompassion when consuming news. Obsessively keeping up with the news only provides us with an illusion of control. We tell ourselves that consuming news keeps us upto-date and therefore ready to act. However, in practice, not only does doom-scrolling not actually help, but worse, we weaken and exhaust ourselves mentally and emotionally, leaving no strength for ourselves and our loved ones.

2. Maintain a daily routine whenever possible.

Definitionally, trauma is unexpected and lacks routine, which makes it very difficult to maintain daily activities like sleep, relaxation, self care, fun, and other things we do to stay well. Trauma forces us to stay on high alert, even if we or people we love have already escaped danger. So in times like these, mental health professionals encourage trying to create a routine, giving ourselves achievable tasks, and discourage us from growing angry at ourselves for not functioning optimally right now. 3. Consider ways to help others through tzedakah (charitable giving) and acts of kindness. We have enormous power, even more than we give ourselves credit for most of the time, to make the world a better place. As University of Minnesota psychologist Ann Masten teaches, "Helping others is one of those win-win strategies of taking action because we're all feeling a sense of helplessness and loss of control about what's going on... but when you take action with other people, you can control what you're doing." In other words, there is a potent benefit to us when we give of our time, money and know-how to help others. It's empowering, especially in times when we're not feeling so powerful.

4. Some of us are not okay right now. And that is okay.

Certainly in the immediate days after Hamas' initial attack against Israel, and still today, so many of us have felt devastated, shattered, heartbroken, angry and powerless. You do not have to tell yourself or others that "It's going to be fine." Rather, simply listening is enough when a friend or family member speaks about the

violence that has ensued and the uncertainty of the ongoing situation in Israel.

There are times when we receive news and experience communal tragedies that shake us to our core. Just as Rabbi Melhman understood in 1973, we are now reminded, fifty years later, of one of life's most important lessons:

Remember in these challenging times that you are not alone. Your Temple Israel community stands with you, our clergy and staff are here to offer support, and together, we can help lift one another. We're in this together. We are better together.

Let us cultivate strength in our own hearts and souls and offer it freely to one another, in the hope and prayer that the One who makes peace in the high heavens will bring peace to us, to Israel, and to all the world.

We pray for peace. We pray for healing.

"This will be our reply to violence: to make music more intensely, more beautifully, more devotedly than ever before." - Leonard Bernstein

I have always believed that music is a universal language with the power to unite and heal us. It brings joy to toddlers as they learn their first songs, connects congregations and community organizations, fosters the sharing of culture, and builds understanding. During times of indescribable grief, music has a power and energy that defies description. It gives voice to our shock, grief, and pain as we try to process and understand the terror attack on our beloved homeland. brothers, and sisters on Simchat Torah morning. Our Yizkor service took on a whole new meaning as we remembered loved ones no longer with us and the yet to be named children, women, and men murdered in Israel. In a matter of hours, our Oseh

Shalom of Friday evening became a somber, subdued fervent plea for peace and understanding at the end of *Yizkor Shabbat* morning.

We continue to sing through our pain, tears, and grief. In doing so, we are celebrating our strength and hope, and becoming the light, love, and compassion that is so desperately needed right now. We embrace opportunities to rededicate and strengthen ourselves individually and collectively each time we come together - celebrating Shabbat and life cycle events. We balance our grief with joy. Am Yisrael Chai! The people of Israel live! The nation of Israel lives! We sing for our homeland, those being held hostage, those injured, families burying their children, sisters, brothers, mothers, fathers, wives, husbands, grandmothers, grandfathers, and our broken hearts and weeping souls. We find our voice again and we strengthen each other as we sing to and for our homeland.

I've heard it said, "Those who sing, Pray twice. Psalm 3, Verse 9 reads:

ָלִיהֹוָה הַיְשׁוּעָה עַל־עַמְּךָ בִּרְכָתֶךָ סֶּלָה:

Rescue is the Lord's! On your people Your blessing. Selah!

Midrash Tehillim unpacks this line as "for all the miracles You do for us it is our obligation to sing songs for You." According to the midrash then, a blessing = a song. So we continue to sing our prayers for healing, hope, strength and peace, even through our tears. We rededicate ourselves to celebrating our 100th birthday and planning for our next century. We light our chanukiyot for Chanukah and rededicate ourselves to being and increasing the light in the world for eight nights and every day and night thereafter. Be the Light. Be the Shamash (helper candle). Every time we come together as a community, we demonstrate and proclaim that we are strong and our community is strong. Am Yisrael Chai! As I tell our students, "Say it loud. Say it proud."

May the One who creates peace in the heavens bring peace to us and all Israel and together we say, Amen.

The Mussar Moment

Rabbi Emeritus Howard Shapiro



We've taught Mussar for so many years at Temple Israel (Dr. Barry Horowitz and I) that it is hard to know what is new and what is old; what we have written about and what we haven't; what would be helpful and what would be redundant. So, I'm not sure I have a good answer. But this is what I know and what comes up for me.

It's not about what is new in the Mussar dictionary of terms and concepts. It is what is new inside of me. What am I ready to admit/confront/ become aware of/confess to myself that I could do better.

It is not about what I do wrong; it is about how I improve my spiritual and ethical center so that when I go out into the world or when I interact with those close and far from me, that I do so from a place of what we call in the Mussar world, holiness.

Or another way to say is that, when we encounter the person who bags our groceries, or the people who direct our traffic, or the staff with whom we share our 9-5 hours, or the one we say goodnight to every night, we do so self-aware and guided by the wisdom of our ethical tradition. That's what Mussar is: an ethical and spiritual discipline that roots itself in the very basic Jewish belief that every person is holy, that every person carries the image of God on their bodies, that every person is a

Neshamah – a holy soul, a spark of the Divine light, a reflection of the sacred act of creation.

We are all a combination of perfect and broken. We are all in the process of becoming, and that is what the Mussar Masters invite us to do: become more than we are in our climb to fulfillment. Do it in the real world and learn from your day-to-day encounters. Mussar is an invitation to appreciate who you are and celebrate who you can become. And if you read this as "heavy" and "too religious," listen to these simple and telling words of the Kotzker Rebbe: "'Fine', he says, 'Be holy. But remember first one has to be a mensch." (Everyday Holiness by Alan Morinis, pg. 15)

One of the core principles of Mussar is that each of us has a task in this world: to become the best version of ourselves that we can be. We will engage with the insights of R. Shalom Wolbe (1914-2005) using his classic text Alei Shur as we strengthen the bonds of our community and engage with the world outside of the classroom. These are the Middot (soul traits) we will incorporate: truth, equanimity, alacrity, honor, humility and gratitude.

Religious School Makes A Difference

When I woke up on Saturday, October 7th, I turned on the news and my mouth gaped open. It had been a really long time since I saw the numbers of rockets flying into Israel on TV. I Just couldn't believe it.

Sure, there have always been incidents here and there and even a war or two that really didn't last very long since Israel became a state.

Somehow, there was always a peace treaty ready to be signed on both ends. Most of these incidents were over land ownership and who was allowed to occupy where. They were also including the terrorist group of Hamas.

As the Director of Education, I always run up against those students who hear about the war from a friend, from someone at school, some in a positive, supportive way and some not so supportive.

Right now, this war was

unexpected by the Israelis, by the United States, I'm sure by most of our allies, and maybe even some that we are not overly friendly with.

I also want to be able to educate them and you as their parents on the situations happening in the land that all are talking about in the times of Torah, in the times of History, in the times of confrontation and confliction.

Stick with us, parents. Let Rabbis Ryan and Carlie, Suzanne, Maggie and I share in the knowledge that is being Jewish right now in today's modern world.

We will all get through this together.

Need a Ride? Palm Tran Can Help!



Some of our members find it difficult to get to us as they are without a car or are hesitant to drive at night. As such, Temple Israel Executive Director Tamekia Graham has contacted Palm Tran Connection and has gathered the following information to assist our members in accessing our services and programs.

- Each person must individually register and book his or her trips
- A doctor's note is required certifying that a need exists e.g. stating a disability or even a mobility issue (use of walker, cane, wheelchair)
- The cost of one ticket is \$3.50 (each way). Ticket books (10 tickets) are available for \$35. An aide or companion can accompany the rider for free
- The Palm Tran Connection runs Monday-Friday 5:30am to 9:30pm, Saturday 6am to 9pm, and Sunday 7:45am to 7:30pm
- Scheduling can be done 24 hours before, via phone or online
- To speak with a Palm Tran agent to determine qualifications, call (561) 649-9848. Once the rider is determined eligible, the appropriate forms will be provided

The application and approval process typically takes 3 weeks to complete once all information is provided. More info can be found at www.palmtran.org/paratransit-customer-service/

January 24: Croquet Lunch & Learn at the National Croquet Club




Vintage New Year cards are important to me because they provide clues about how we Jews used to live. They show changes in dress, communication, transportation, life in Europe as well as in the U.S.A., and important events in Israeli history. They reflect the hopes

and dreams of our ancestors.

Today's cards, which fewer and fewer people send, mainly show holiday symbols-apples, honey, pomegranates, shofars, Torahs, and peace doves. While they can be beautifully designed, they say nothing about how we modern Jews live and I think something's lost because of that.

I started collecting old Rosh Hashanah cards almost as a demand for equal time. I had been a postcard collector for many years. While there were several categories like Halloween, Easter and Christmas cards, they appealed to Christian collectors. I made it a goal to look for vintage Jewish postcards and once I started, I couldn't stop.
