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From Our President

For the last two years, almost every description of Temple Israel has included the word "change." Changing our rabbis, campus, finances, music, and mood is part of our great adventure, which has many challenges. Change is hard for several reasons. One is uncertainty, unease about a future that can't be easily imagined. Another is feeling powerless that things are moving and there's nothing one can do about it. Change can be awkward, as awkwardness is the feeling of learning something new. The most impactful reason is that people don't fear change; they fear loss - losing the comfort of familiarity, meaning, and identity. One might ask, "Why change things?" The more important question is, "What happens if things don't change?" The answer is clear: Temple Israel would fade away. Fortunately, change is also empowering. Temple Israel will thrive, not vanish. Our leadership is tackling each challenge headon. They have a vision, listen to our congregants, and are committed to gradual transition while preserving our traditions.

Our path forward is based on a shared foundation of TI's mission,

vision, and values. Congregations change, so it's recommended that each revisits its mission, vision, and values statements every decade. It's time for us to do so. A mission statement answers, "Why are we here?" A vision statement answers, "What is our dream?" A values statement answers "What is important to us?" The location of our three statements is elusive. The closest matches are these statements drafted by TI's recent Rabbinic Search Committee.

Mission Statement. Our mission is to foster a vibrant, spiritual, and inclusive center of Reform
Judaism. Together, we connect through worship, tradition, celebration, and life-long learning.
Our central purpose is to engage all generations to become better human beings committed to synagogue life, our Jewish community, Israel, and repairing the world.

Vision Statement. Inspire and excite congregants through joyful worship, meaningful learning, and stimulating programming. Remain relevant in all undertakings – religious and secular. Sustain the longevity of Temple Israel.

Values Statement: Kehillah:
Congregational community is our credo: "Pray. Connect. Thrive."
We welcome all people into TI.
Our Chesed committee supports those in need in our congregation.
We are a singing congregation

with traditional and modern prayers. Our choir has been together for over 30 years. We have a strong brotherhood and sisterhood engaging our intergenerational TI community. Our religious school is structured to build relationships among our families. Spirituality: Our learned member volunteers lead outreach and education programs for our members and the community. These offerings include Mussar classes and our "Simply Jewish" series of thought leaders, authors, performers, and educators who explore the rich tapestry of the Jewish experience. We also offer Hartman Institute programming. Finally, we regularly update our programming to support our congregants' quest for lifelong learning and spirituality.

We need to begin formally reviewing, reconsidering, and rewriting these statements. This process will take time and backand-forth dialogue between the congregation and a representative group coordinating the project. This project is about all of us, and it's about you. Ask these questions: Why are we here? What is our dream? What is important to us? Talk with each other. Talk with our leadership. Talk with me. Talk with our rabbis. The answers we agree on will be the foundation for us to rise above the challenges of change and plan our adventure together.

Freedom Song: What Am I A Slave To?

So often we hear from both children and adults that their Passover Haggadah (the written guide to the Passover ritual and meal) is not as engaging as they would like, which inspires some to create their own. That same desire to package the Passover narrative in a more accessible way has birthed the creation of many niche Haggadot over the years: *Haggadot* for cat lovers, world travelers, Star Wars enthusiasts and even baseball fans. In fact. Rabbi Ryan and his brother, Jon, were invited to write the foreword to a new baseballthemed *Haggadah* in 2015.

However, regardless of the thematic lens through which we engage with Passover, what is most important is that we read the *Haggadah* not simply as a storybook of our ancestor's journey out of

Egypt, but rather as a tool that encourages each of us to step into the story and wrestle with the holiday's big questions. As we read every year around the Passover table, "In every generation a person is obligated to look at oneself as if they personally had gone out of Egypt" (Pesachim 116b). Immersing ourselves in the story connects us to each other and to the larger Passover narrative of which we are all a part, even if we each experience that narrative differently.

The Hebrew word for Egypt is Mitzrayim, derived from the phrase "m'tzarim," meaning "from a narrow place." Surely this year we have each navigated our own mitzrayim, our own places of struggle, tight control or narrowmindedness. Perhaps they were the external straits of financial, marital or medical problems, or the more solitary struggles of personal tragedy, mental health or addiction. To heed the call that we are each to see ourselves as if we personally were freed from Egypt requires that we first ask ourselves, "What am I a slave to?" As our teacher, Rabbi Mark Borovitz, explains, "All of us humans are

enslaved by something. The enslavement may be a job that we don't like, a repetitive theme in our lives, a dependence on material things, a dependence on needing to be right, a psychological problem, or a level of discomfort in our lives that we have learned to accept."

Rabbi Borovitz is Rabbi Emeritus of Beit T'Shuvah. a synagogue and center for recovery in Los Angeles. Its mission is "to heal broken souls and save the lives of those wrestling with addiction by providing integrated care in a community setting." They do great work out in the community as well, including touring their Hollywoodquality musical, Freedom Song, all around the country. By interweaving a Passover Seder with personal stories of addiction, Freedom Song poses one stark question, "What are you a slave to?" The cast of this original musical are not actors; they are actual addicts in recovery who have broken off the shackles of drugs, alcohol, gambling, and other destructive behaviors. Using song and dance, tears and laughter, and a powerful post-

show discussion with the cast, Freedom Song will open your eyes to the real life struggle against the 'bondage of self' that many fight every day.

We are honored to partner with Alpert Jewish Family Service to bring Freedom Song back to South Florida on Sunday, April 7th at 4 pm at Temple Israel. Of note, this will be the first tour for many in their current cast of performers. For tickets, please visit: Temple-Israel.com/freedom. All are welcome.

We acknowledge that the Passover theme of journeying

from enslavement to redemption serves as a bridge to the language of recovery, a journey that individuals make one step at a time, from a place of brokenness and constriction to freedom and possibility. Those who identify in recovery, perhaps working a 12-Step program like Alcoholics Anonymous, are often more practiced at this kind of thinking. And it does take practice.

But if we are really being honest with ourselves, surely there is at least something from which we each desire to be liberated. For some of us, it might be to refrain from drugs

and alcohol. For others it might be the desire to be freed from unhealthy relationships, unproductive thinking, unsustainable spending or unfulfilling employment. Consider Passover as our opportunity to really wrestle with that which keeps us enslaved, and a reminder that redemption is possible. In fact, the theme of redemption is central to our foundational narrative, repeated throughout the Torah and reiterated by sedergoers each spring. Regardless of how it is packaged in the Haggadah we will use, surely it is a message worth taking in again this season.

Two, Two, Two Months of Sacred Joy!

... And how many of you recognized the Certs commercial from back in the day: "Two, two, two mints in one? And only 10 cents for an entire roll!"

The Talmud says, "When Adar enters, joy increases." We welcomed Adar I at our February 9th Erev Shabbat Service. Thanks to our lunar calendar, 5784 has a leap year, giving us two months of Adar I and Adar II. Two, two, two months of joy! We celebrate *Purim* – Mordechai and Esther triumphing over Haman (BOO!) in Adar II at our Upside Down Erev Shabbat Services on March 22nd. We wear costumes. retell the story from the Book of Esther, Boo every time we hear "Haman," drink/rejoice when we hear "Mordechai" and give mishloach manot (Purim gift baskets). Many liken it to Halloween or Mardi Gras.

So, why am I writing about sacred joy? Many of you know this is sacred work for me, and building a sacred community is an important part of my cantorate. The word "sacred" speaks to being intentional with how we interact with one another; remembering we are all created b'tzelem Elohim (in the image of G-d) and we are interacting with the G-d inside each other. It helps raise the vibration for good in our world. For me, it's an important part of tikkun olam - repairing the world, and an opportunity for us to help repair each other. This is one way we can become #walkingtorahs.

On January 25th, a group of us had the honor of touring The Lords Place and meeting with Diana Stanley, their Chief Executive Officer, and staff. Wow! Talk about sacred work and sacred people. This is where I experienced sacred engagement, which brings me to sacred joy. Why can't we invite the sacred to everything we do? Especially with each other, especially now with everything going on in our world and our homeland.

Maybe each of us is being called upon to be Esther or Mordechai right now. We can

help change the world and embrace the words from the Book of Esther. והחדש אשר the month - נהפך מיגון לשמחה was reversed for the Jews from one of grief to one of joy. Dare I say the month was reversed for the Jews from one of grief to one of sacred joy? Yes, I dare and I do say it. Won't you join me in sacred joy?

May we all embrace the G-d, Esther, and Mordechai in ourselves and each other right now, and in doing so, help to repair our very broken world, souls, and hearts. May all our hostages be returned home safely by the time of this publication. Kein y'hi ratzon.

The Mussar Moment

It is a beautiful afternoon; the sun is streaming in through the windows and it is one of those cool Florida days we dream about in the summer. I have fresh air coming in and music playing through my speakers. Spotify suggested a playlist called "Your Time Capsule" and the first song is "You'll Be Back" from Hamilton. King George is singing to the colonies, suggesting they don't know the cost of freedom and independence and they'll be back when they see how hard it is to govern and get along, forget progress.

I thought – amazing. How much have we learned? The

political process our elected representatives engage in certainly underscores the question. Take the immigration issue. It's mindblowing to think that rather than compromise and move forward to a resolution of the myriad of problems at our borders and in our cities. some of our leaders would rather keep the issue hot and centered so that it can become political fodder for the November elections. (Maybe by the time you read this, saner heads will have prevailed.)

And this is a Mussar issue, because? Because Mussar is about living an examined life; Mussar is about self-reflection and taking stock of ourselves and our behavior. It is about caring for others and sharing our strengths and talents, creating an organic, compassionate community. It is not about winning; it is not about

self-aggrandizement. It is listening to the collective ethical wisdom of the ages and applying it to our lives. It is about humility, which Mussar teaches with great wisdom as finding your place and celebrating it. One dictionary defines humility as "a modest or low view of one's importance." That's not the Jewish understanding. It is the affirmation that everyone has a place, and everyone is both sacred and holy. Everyone is of value and worth and the challenge is that, depending on the situation, you might be center stage or in the wings or in the audience. But you are always worthwhile.

The Mussar masters remind us we are never done – we are constantly evolving and refining and honing our "souls" to be a beacon of light and love. And to do that: no King George, no matter how well he sings.

Celebrating Purim in the U.S. has evolved. When I was a child, you dressed up as one of the characters in the Book of Esther. Today, we get superheroes, princesses, etc. You get the picture, or do you?

Those of you who did not attend religious school or do not recall the story in the Book of Esther, take the time and google the English translation. Our 21st-century rabbis are always telling us that there are modern stories that correlate with the ancient stories in the Torah. Well, in our world today, we are living the story of Purim. There is no conclusion yet, but we are working on it.

In the meantime, there are other traditions besides the costume parade. One tradition is *Mishloach Manot*, which translates as "sending of portions." In layman's terms, you put a box of goodies together and give it to someone you love, someone who is having a hard time, or

even someone you don't know and want to see smile. In the Book of Esther, *Mishloach Manot* is given out to make sure there is enough food for everyone.

A minhag, or tradition, is to fill a decorated box, some in the shape of a three-cornered hat. and others in the shape of a Dunkin Munchkin box, with a variety of goodies. Typically, a Mishloach Manot box is filled with candy, a noisemaker, a bottle of grape juice or wine, a decorated mask, and stickers. Oh! I almost forgot the most important – *Hamantaschen!* Let me refresh your memory. Hamantaschen, a 3-cornered pastry or cookie, is named for the villain in the Book of Esther, Haman, who was known to wear a threecornered hat. There is another symbol that is not as widely known, which is Haman's ears.

In our *Megillah* of Esther, there is a happy ending; the religious school is going to take that ending and run with it. TI Religious School is hosting a fundraiser that asks you to purchase a *Mishloach Manot* full of goodies for \$18.00 per box. Let me explain how this works:

- 1. Purchase a box/boxes and write who you would like them to go to. The recipients will receive a notice and a time as to when they can pick up their *Mishloach Manot*.
- 2. You can fill out the form to donate funds to the IDF, as Israeli soldiers are in need of many supplies. Your donation will certainly help them out.

Purim is also celebrated in Israel. Streets are closed off and everyone parades in costumes. The adults can celebrate with alcoholic beverages. It can get a bit rowdy in the streets of Israel during this holiday.

But, the most important thing that we as Jews should remember, is the freedom that was awarded to the Jews by Mordechai and his army, who valiantly fought for their freedom against the Amalekites and won.

Freedom! That's what it's all about.

Who are you going to dress as this year at Purim? Don't forget, there are masks in the *Mishloach Manot* boxes! Or, decorate your own and come to Temple Israel to join in on the Purim celebration on Friday, March 22, 2024.




